## SHORT COURSE LITERARY GROWS IN POPULARITY

Programs Given by the Jarvis Classes in Home Economics and Agriculture Prove Interesting

On Friday, January 6th, the Jarvis classes in Home Economics and Agriculture presented a varied program which attracted a number of visitors. The President, Jean Oakes, occupied the chair and the meeting opened with the singing of "The Maple Leaf." The Agricultural class paper, "Scientific Agriculture," followed, read by Harold Johnson, after which Cora Henning rendered a piano solo. The two main features of the afternoon were an address by Mr. Mitchell, Public School Inspector, and a debate. Prefacing his remarks with some timely stories, Mr. Mitchell left some good advice with the students, in whose work he is much interested. The debate, "Resolved, that Co-operation is a Greater Factor in Community Development than Competition," was contested by Russell Walker and Harry Pratten, who upheld the affirmative, and Doris Ionsen and Elena Gee, who supported the negative. The judges' decision was given in favor of the affirmative. Norma Stallwood sang a well received solo, and after the debate the audience joined in singing "The Old Folks at Home. The Home Economics paper, "Vegetable Soup," was read by Mabel Johnson; and the singing of "God Save the King," brought the meeting to a close.

The five hundred Junior Farmers who attended the Royal Winter Fair as guests of the Ontario Department of Agriculture were invited to Toronto and the Royal Winter Fair. The Ontario Department of Agriculture offered ten prizes for the ten best essays written by Junior Farmers. Each prize consisted of free transportation board and lodging for two consecutive weeks while attending a short course at the Ontario Agricultural College or the Kemptonville Agricultural School. Mr. Sanford Walker, Cayuga R. R. 2, was one of the successful ten and has been awarded a free two-weeks' short course at the O.A.C. Mr. Walker is to be congratulated on his success in this large competition for having not only brought honor to himself but to the County of Haldimand. The essay reads as follows:—

## LETTER FROM C.S.E.T. WORKER

January 1st, 1928.  
Fellow C.S.E.T. Workers:—  
I have been requested by our Column Editor to give a short summary of our work at Parliament. Fellows, all I can say is that it was wonderful. To meet boys from all over the province was my privilege; from Ottawa, Sault Ste Marie, Kingston, Border cities, Owen Sound, etc. These boys, the pick of the province, met to join their ideas, to give and to receive. 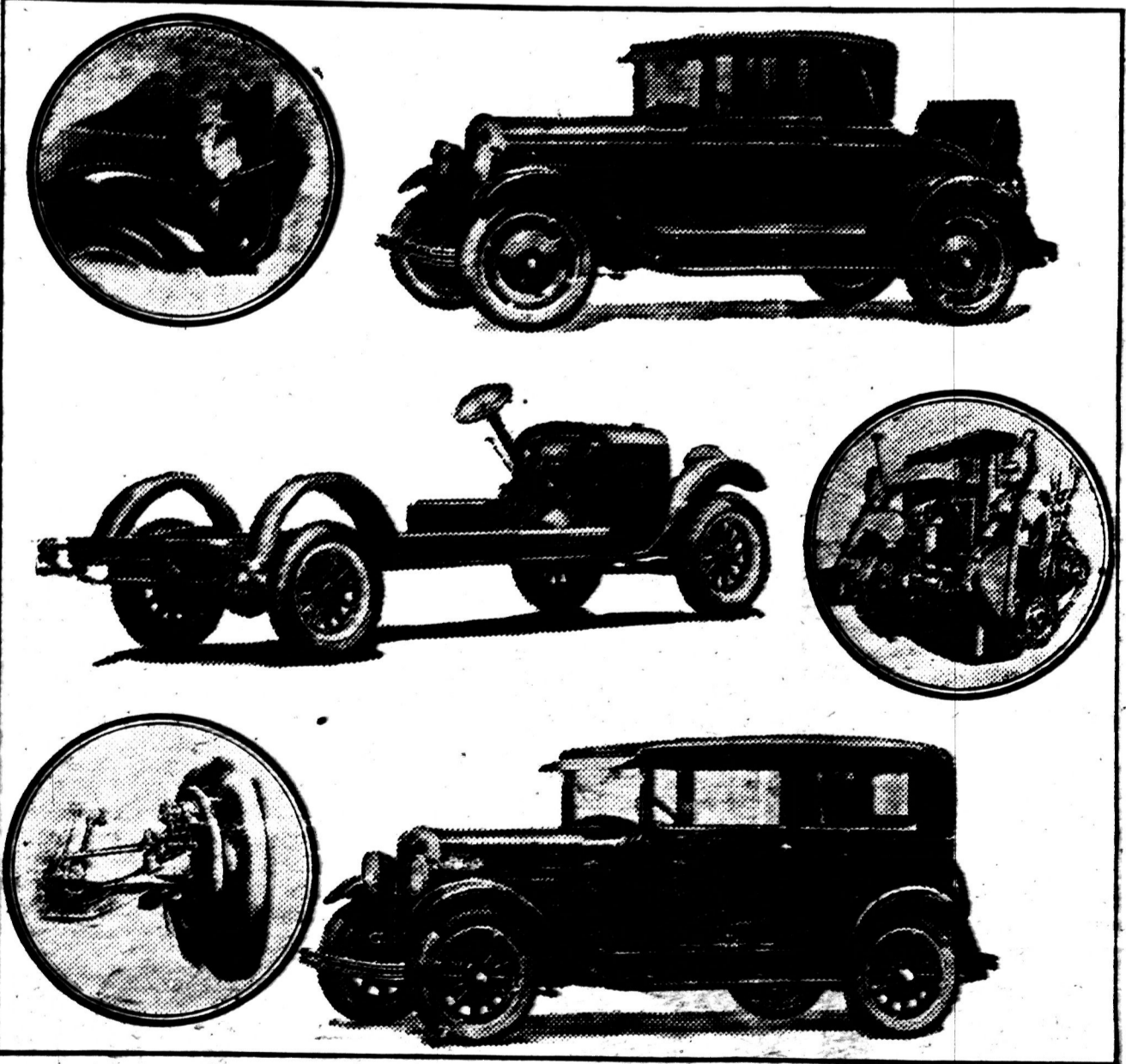
