PT. DOVER-ERIE TRANSIT CO. TO ADD TWO BOATS FOR 1928

Representatives of the Port Dover-Erie Transit Company were in Port Dover on Tuesday last conferring with local officials with a view to improving their schedule for the season of 1928. Last year two boats made double trips daily between Port Dover and Erie, Pa., and the season was the best Port Dover has even known.

The prospects are that this year will eclipse even last year's big business and, with the harbor improvements that will be carried out, following the damage done in the big storm of December 8th. The steamship company wants to be in readiness to open the season earlier than last year. It is also contemplated that new freight sheds will be built and the boats will carry freight, as well as passengers and motor cars, providing six hour service from Toronto to Erie, Pa.

Manager Brown stated that his company will put on four boats this season, which will provide six boats out of Port Dover every day, with direct connection with Cleveland, Pittsburg, Erie and points south.

Port Dover expects to be treated generously in the estimates this year and the Village Council will co-operate in every way and plans for an extensive advertising campaign are now under construction.

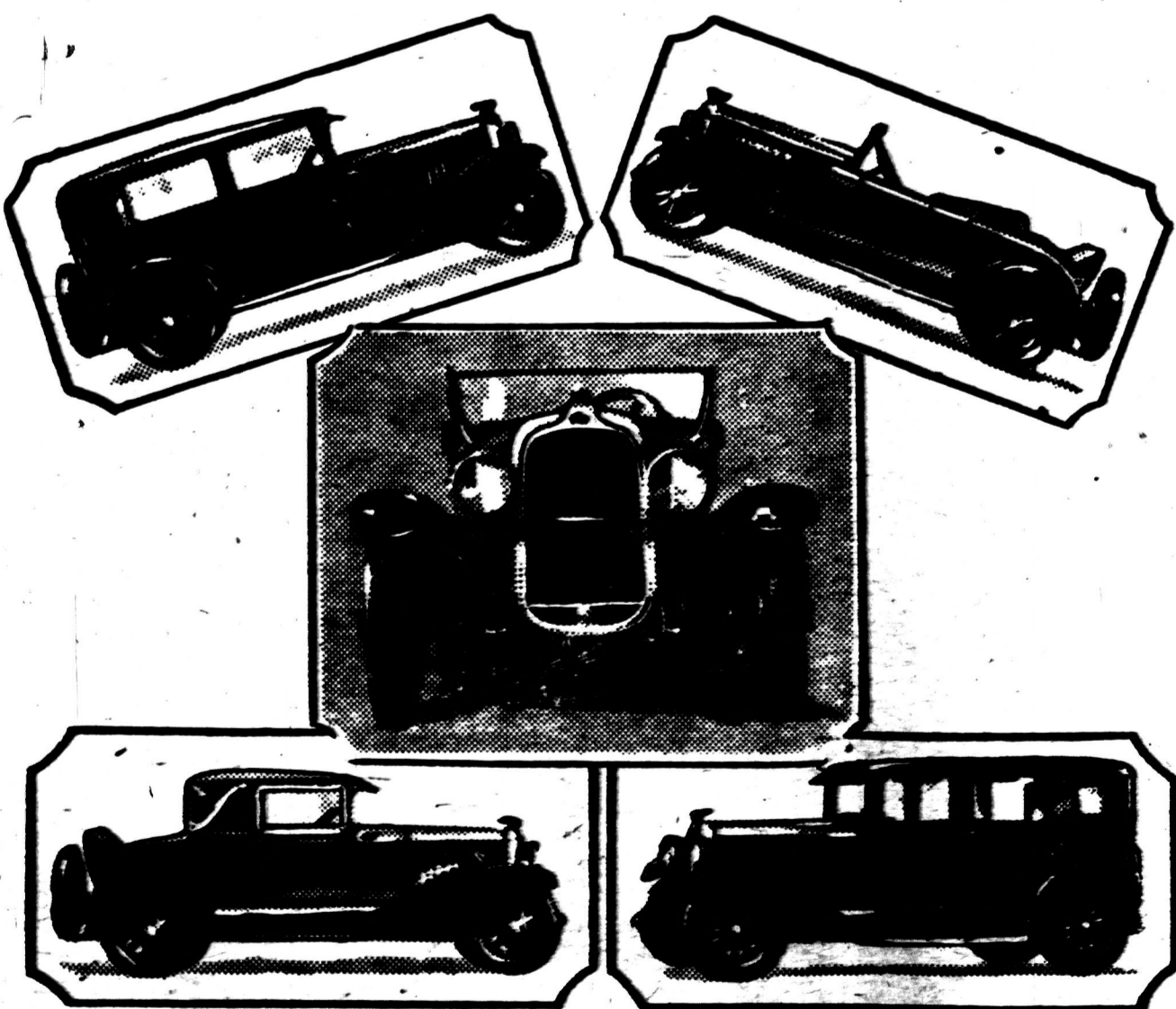
