## THE MOCK PARLIAMENT

Peacock's Hall proved to be the centre of interest in the Jarvis district on Friday, January 20th. Under the careful leadership of R. F. Miller, M.P.P., a Mock Parliament was staged, which occupied the entire afternoon.

Many people from the country districts were present and spoke highly of the afternoon's program. Among those present were real "he-men." Whether or not they considered the material extremely valid has not yet been ascertained. Time only, will tell.

Every detail in Parliamentary procedure was observed. The Lieutenant-Governor had as his escorts, six girl attendants, who attracted much attention. The Government was represented by the School of Home Economics, and the Opposition by the School of Agriculture. Some very clever speeches were presented by the girls, who proved to be superior upon this occasion.

Two Bills were introduced, one respecting the government ownership and operation of the telephone systems in Ontario, and the other respecting the taxing of unmarried males.

Thanks are due to R. F. Miller, M.P.P., who very capably engineered the entire procedure and explained each step in detail before it was carried out by the respective students.

## ANNIVERSARY SERVICES OF KNOX CHURCH, JARVIS

The anniversary services of Knox Church, Jarvis on Sunday and Monday last were surely a grand success. Large audiences assembled at each service. The music was excellent, the choir being ably assisted by Mr. John A. Marsh and Mrs. Marsh of Hamilton. The offerings upon the plate showed a very wholesome condition of the congregation, and the sermons were such as Jarvis will not soon forget. Rev. Mr. Brand of the United Church, very ably and cordially assisted in the evening service, glowing a splendid Christian spirit.

On Monday evening at the lecture, "A Night in the Skies, the audience was large and the talk and views of the heavenly bodies were beyond the expectation of the audience. The people sat spellbound for two full hours as the various heavenly bodies were thrown upon the screen. Pictures of some of the great telescopes of the world were shown, including Rev. Dr. Marsh's own telescope and other instruments. Then came photos of the planets: Mars with his snow covered poles, the giant Jupiter, Saturn with her great rings, how she appears to lose them every 15 years. Then came the Moon—and such splendid photographs and vision; cracks in the lunar surface, old volcanoes, the towering mountain peaks, the deep valley and the old ocean beds, were plainly seen. Then came the sun—and such a sight. The faculae, willowleaf as the granular photosphere sometimes look like chromosomes, the great sun fires and the coronal streamers. The audience were shown the star clusters, spirals and stars by the millions.

The Rev. G. W. Blake of Hamilton, officiated as chairman and performed his duties in a very dignified manner. At the close of the talk a number of questions were asked, which Rev. Dr. Marsh answered very satisfactorily.

A vote of thanks was tendered the speaker and the very interesting and instructive meeting closed with the benediction by Rev. G. W. Blake.

## DEATH OF MRS. JAMES HAZLETT

All Jarvis was deeply and painfully shocked on Thursday morning last when it was learned that Mrs. James Hazlett, who on Sunday, January 15, celebrated her 55th birthday, had passed away after an illness of only a few days. Before her marriage, May 6th, 1903, she was Margaret Blaine, daughter of the late Captain and Mrs. Jane Blaine of Toronto Township, Peel County.

Mrs. Hazlett was stricken with plural pneumonia on January 10th and from then on, despite the best medical attendance and careful nursing, she gradually sank until her death, early Thursday morning. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon at Knox church for service and thence for burial. The service was conducted by the Rev. Dr. Marsh, pastor of that church.

## REWARD TO REFORMATORY FOR ISSUING BAD CHECKS

Lawrence Louis Legree who came from Port Rowan to Jarvis and resided in the local phone premises, pleaded guilty in the Simcoe police court on Wednesday afternoon last to several charges of issuing cheques on banks in Port Rowan and Tillsonburg, in which he knew he had no funds. He was charged with issuing cheques without funds to cover, with intent to defraud, viz: To Gordon Mianer, of Woodhouse, \$15; to Roger Cropp, Simcoe, \$15; to J. C. Cropp, of Delhi, \$22.50; to C. Freese, of Charlotteville, \$15; L. Lavine, of J. Cork, \$5.

The case first came up a week ago Wednesday, when the accused was committed, and meantime Legree was out on bail. During his freedom he is said to have got into trouble with a taxi driver in Tillsonburg, over a fare, payment of which he attempted to evade. For this he was fined \$10 and costs or thirty days in jail. As he had no money he was committed to Woodstock jail. Accordingly before he could appear before Magistrate Gorton, in Simcoe, it was necessary to have Judge Boles issue an order instructing the Ontario officials to produce the accused in Simcoe, and he came under escort of Sheriff McGhee and another officer.

Legree pleaded guilty to all except the Lavine charge. He was adjudged guilty and sentenced to six months determinate and 12 months indeterminate at the Ontario reformatory. His young wife and a baby of 11 months are left to shift for themselves.

We also understand that several legal residents were his victims for small amounts.

## THE LATE MRS. JAS. THOMPSON

There passed away in Port Dover on Monday, December 12th, 1927, one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of this district in the person of Nancy Catherine McCready, widow of the late James Thompson.

The late Mrs. Thompson was a daughter of the late James and Mary McCready, and was born in Walpole township, County of Haldimand, in February, 1846. She was married at Nanticoke in 1864 to James Thompson, and with the exception of the last twelve years, was a life-long resident of Nanticoke.

Deceased was a member of Nanticoke Methodist Church, and in her younger days took an active interest in the work of the church and the various organizations, taking a keen delight to do what little she could in the service of the Master. She set a noble example for others to follow and was never absent from divine worship unless through illness. She was a woman whom everyone loved, honored and respected and it indeed a privilege to be numbered among her friends.

Mrs. Thompson had been making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Walker Evans, following the death of her husband about twelve years ago. She was apparently in her usual health when she retired for the night, but ere the dawn of another day she had answered the last call. Her passing came as a surprise and a shock to her many friends both in the port and in the village where she had made her home for so many years.

Of a family of seven children, only three survive, Thos. Thompson, of Nanticoke; Calvin Thompson, Hagersville; and Mrs. Walker Evans, Port Dover.

The funeral took place on Wednesday December 14, and was largely attended. Rev. C. A. Perkins of the Grace United Church had charge of the services, interment being made in the family plot at Nanticoke cemetery.

Many beautiful floral tributes bore silent testimony to the esteem in which deceased was held in the community.
