THE LATE CHARLES G. ALLEN

In the passing of Charles G. Allen, on June 19th, 1923, Jarvis has lost one of its honored citizens and Haldimand one of a pioneer family. The late Mr. Allen was born in 1849 on the Stage Road east of Jarvis and as a young man 19 years of age he came to Jarvis to assume a position as clerk in the store of Armour and Hestwell. Six years later in 1874, he went into business for himself and carried on his bakery and grocery business successfully until 1905, when he retired into private life. In 1876 Mr. Allen was married to Miss Esther A. Rodgers. The widow and two children, Cameron E., of Roland, Manitoba, and Leonora M., of Jarvis are left to mourn his loss.

Mr. Allen held many positions of trust during his life. Trustee of the Public School Board for nine years, Treasurer of the Agricultural Society and at his death was President of the Public Library.

The funeral service was held at the family residence on Friday, June 22. A very large number of relatives and friends were present. Rev. P. T. Deeth of the United Church, Jarvis, and the Rev. W. T. Brown, of Buffalo, former pastor of Knox Presbyterian church, Jarvis, officiated. Mr. Eugene Hoover sang very acceptably as a solo, "One Sweetly Solemn Thought." Rev. Mr. Brown, who was intimately acquainted with deceased, spoke feelingly of the sterling qualities of the late Mr. Allen. "A true and noble man of God has been taken from our midst" was the speaker's striking testimony.

Interment was in Knox Church cemetery. The floral tributes were many and beautiful showing the esteem in which he was held by friends and community.
