think, my lord," she asked, turning
to Dr. Temple, "that her escape was
providential?" "Well, not knowing
your aunt, I can't say," came the
blunt response.

Many are the tales told of the
great prelate. One hinges upon the
fact that Dr. Goe, formerly rector of
St. George's, Bloomsbury, and after-
wards Bishop of Melbourne, was the
possessor of two very curious names
—Fields Flowers. This reverend gen-
tleman in his salad days, so it is said,
was "ploughed for smalls." Dr. Tem-
ple was among the examiners, and
when the unfortunate young man
came up to learn his fate, he was
thus addressed by the late Primate:
"Field, you're ploughed; Flowers,

too!"

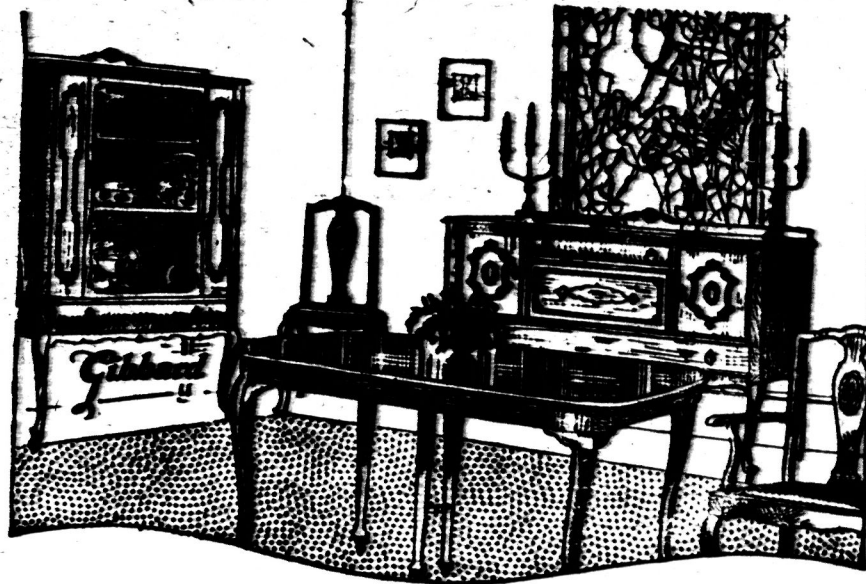
The Monster in Person.
