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BROTHER AND SISTER UNITED AFTER ABSENCE OF 60 YEARS

Niagara Falls, N.Y., July 1.—Marcus Heaslip, Dallas, Texas, and his sister, Mrs. Della Ferro, Niagara Falls, Ont., who had not seen nor communicated with each other for 60 years, met here Saturday, reunited by a visit each made several months ago to their mother's grave in the little cemetery at St. Anne's, near St. Catharines, Ont. The brother and sister left following their reunion for Heaslip's home in Dallas, where Mrs. Ferro will visit. They will stop off to visit relatives at Hamilton, Ont., Detroit, Mich., and Chicago, en route. Heaslip left the family home in St. Anne's 60 years ago and learned the printer's trade in Toronto. He drifted to the States and is now proof-reader for The Dallas Morning News. His mother died and his sister married. He did not know the name of the latter's husband and efforts he made to locate her were unsuccessful. A year ago he came to Canada and visited his mother's grave at St. Anne's. He gave his name and address to the sexton of the graveyard, and when Mrs. Ferro visited the cemetery several months later the sexton told her of her brother's visit. She wrote to Heaslip and the reunion was effected.—Toronto Globe.

Mr. Heaslip mentioned in the above came to Canada to attend the Snyder reunion last year and he and his sister attended the same this year.

W. Croft Blamed By Coroner's Jury

At the inquest held in Jarvis on Monday afternoon, Robert Gilmore, who was Croft's companion, testified that he thought the automobile struck Moses Furlong, an aged man, on the Third Line, about 60 rods east of the Nanticoke Road, on the night of July 5th, 6th. Mr. Furlong, who was 74 years of age was found one hour later by another motorist and died shortly afterward.

Croft, who is alleged to have not stopped or reported the accident, was arrested on a charge of criminal negligence. The jury empanelled by Coroner Quance to investigate Mr. Furlong's death, returned a verdict that Croft's car was responsible, and that it was not properly equipped with headlights. It was understood that Croft purchased the car for \$20. It had not headlights, but did have a spotlight which showed a small ray for about 15 feet. Gilmore believed the fender struck the old man, but he did not think Mr. Furlong was hurt seriously. R. Gilmore, who rode with Croft, said he felt "a bump" and believed that it was when Mr. Furlong was run over.

E. Gilmore, a contractor of Hamilton, said he was passing the spot about an hour later when he saw a cap lying in the roadway. He stopped to investigate and found Furlong unconscious and hurt seriously. He helped carry the aged man into Mr. Webb's home.

Croft was put under bond to appear before Col. Massie in Jarvis on July 17th.

Mr. Stadter was within a day of being 79 years old and had lived almost the whole of his life on the same farm. He was a Liberal in politics and highly respected. The family left behind are: one son, John on the homestead; Mrs. Kate Read and Mrs. Dr. Bone, both of Hagersville. Interment was in the cemetery at Gill.
