Brot Albanach appeared on the menu of the "Traith Neoin Bhadh bliath air a bhord; air an 3mh lath de'n Naoitheamh Mìos," and if any of those who attended the Highland Gathering and Scottish Music Festival at Banff last year could read that far, they knew that "Gruthan laogh leth bhruichte, agus mulcail slis-nichte," was nothing more formidable than broiled calves liver with bacon. If they ordered it, they will probably go back for more. The Highland Gathering was a great success last year. This year, between August 31 and September 3, it will be repeated. Banff will be Scotland for a week. Pipes will skirl through the forests and hills; the tartan will colour the trail; and there will be dancing, highland dancing, and dance contests,—and Caledonia games, tossing the caber, and putting the shot. And in the evening, music—Scottish music—with famous singers as interpreters. For the first time in Caledonia,—for the first time in nearly a hundred years anywhere, Burns' Cantata "The Jolly Beggars," will be presented.—Gaelic, and the songs of the Lowland Scots; and on Sunday, at Sun Dance Canyon, a service in the open air. The old Covenanters tunes will be heard among the hills, and the piper will play the minister to his pulpit. Paintings and Pageantry.—His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has once more graciously given his patronage to the Banff Highland gathering.

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## DOMINION TO MARK HISTORICAL SITES

The Monuments Board Selects One at Nanticoke for Commemoration

The historic sites and monuments board of Canada has selected a number of spots to be marked with obelisks or cairns. There were 110 sites considered, and those in Ontario deemed worthy of commemoration are as follows:

Toronto—Sir Gordon Drummond, talented military commander who served in the war of 1812 and who administered the civil affairs of Upper and Lower Canada in critical times.

Nanticoke, Haldimand county—On November 13th, 1813, the Norfolk county units routed a band of marauders. This exploit, inspired the military forces and restored the confidence of the people.

Ft. Drummond, Queenstown Heights—Fort built for the defense of the frontier in 1814 and named in honor of Sir Gordon Drummond.

Niagara-on-the-Lake—Commemorating the treaties concluded with the Chippewa and Mississauga Indians by Col. Guy Johnson, May 9, 1671, and Lt.-Col. John Butler, May 22, 1815.

Kingston Navy Yard—Naval station for Lake Ontario during the years 1788-1818. Here were built 14 King's ships. In the war of 1812-14 this naval force enabled the army to retain control of Upper Canada.

Amherstburg Navy Yard—The British naval station for Lakes Erie and Huron during the years 1796-1812. Here the king's ships were built.
