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LITTLE JIMMIE MILLER KILLED

First Accident on the New Caledonia Bridge

Little Jimmie Miller, 9 years old, was knocked down on Monday afternoon by a truck while crossing the new provincial bridge over the Grand River here. The little fellow, who lived in Oneida with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Miller, had been sent to the drug store on the north side of the bridge for medicine, and at the second span at the south end of the bridge, from the walk on the west side he suddenly darted out, apparently to cross to the east side. When Edward's Transport of Port Dover in charge of Harold Johnson of Port Dover and Harold Miller of Jarvis was crossing the bridge, going south. The truck which was about 10 feet from the boy when he darted out, struck the lad throwing him with force to the cement floor. The driver stopped within four feet after hitting him, and picking up the unconscious child carried him to Taggart's store and called Dr. Mav, but the child only lived a few minutes after the doctor's arrival. Chief Fraser of Caledonia and Dr. Quance, coroner from Hagersville, were called and after examining the body an inquest was ordered for Thursday at 2 p.m. The child has always resided with his grandparents and was exceptionally bright and intelligent. He attended the No. 11 Six Nations school, a pupil of Miss Garnet Atkins. His grandfather, who is a councillor at Six Nations, was immediately sent for, but the child was dead when he arrived. Mrs. Miller, who suffers from heart trouble, almost collapsed when told the sad news. The funeral was held on Wednesday at 2 o'clock at Oshweken Baptist Burying Ground—Sachem, Caledonia.

Any person who has previously won 1st prize in any section of the Judging Competition will not be eligible to compete in that section.
