Here and There

(93) Quebec, Que.—Announcement from Ottawa, from Dr. W. H. Collins, Director of the Geological Survey of Canada, promise several survey parties in Quebec Province this year, mapping and investigating into the geology and mineral resources of the province.

Six hundred delegates to the World's Baptist Congress meeting in Toronto, June 23-25, virtually chartered Canadian Pacific liner Montreal, and were taken on from ship's side to Toronto by special C. P. R. train. Following the congress, the delegates make a trip across Canada to the Pacific Coast and return.

Edmonton, Alberta.—Looking to the improvement of wool produced by the sheep ranchers of the Prairies, a party of experts has started out under the direction of the Research Council of Canada to make a survey of the representative sheep ranches of the three provinces. British Columbia is included in the tour.

Winnipeg, Manitoba.—The formation of a dairy pool is suggested as a possible means of meeting the competition of Denmark in dairy produce on the British market by Sir Thomas Allen, leader of the co-operative movement in Great Britain and special envoy of the Empire Marketing Board at the wheat pool conference in Regina.

Indian Head, Saskatchewan.—One hundred million trees have been distributed throughout the Western provinces from the Forestry Farm here and its subsidiary at Sutherland, and the work is still progressing at an unabated rate. Practically all go free to farmers and an average of a car a day is shipped. The work was started in 1901.

The Alpine Club of Canada will hold its 23rd annual camp July 17-31 at the Lake of the Hanging Glaciers in the Purcell Range of the Banff National Park. The trip head for the camp which is five hours motor journey farther on. Eleven peaks all above ten, and some exceeding eleven thousand feet in height, will be at the climbing disposal of the campers. There are also many others between nine and ten thousand feet high.

East makes its annual bow to West with the University of Montreal trip across Canada to the Pacific and back, starting from Montreal July 7. Many prominent French-Canadians make this annual trip which is sponsored by the University and run on Canadian Pacific trails, motor facilities and Great Lakes steamships. All the major cities of the West and the beauty spots of the Rockies are covered in this popular tour.

Younger railwaymen in the employ of the great Canadian transportation companies held their first annual conference at Montreal recently under Y. M. C. A. auspices. The young men came from all points in Canada between Halifax and Vancouver and quickly got acquainted, swapping experiences and stories in friendliest fashion after the first informal introduction. It is hoped to repeat the conference yearly.

With concrete now up as far as the first bedroom windows and steel up to the fourth, the Royal York C. P. R. monster hotel in Toronto is well up to schedule and is expected to be complete in time for the opening next May, notwithstanding the short strike of the steel and building trades.

W. M. Van Valkenburg, president of the Regina Board of Trade, says that his city and province are out to capture industries. That is one reason for his visit to Montreal and the Eastern States. He figures that the mineral resources of the province should provide the basis of a number of industries, as 42 per cent of the provincial area lies within the pre-Cambrian shield.

Inauguration of the new New York-Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, passenger ship service recently represented the first entrance of a vessel from New York into Yarmouth harbor for the past 20 years. This was the S.S. Evangeline, of the Eastern Steamship Line, carrying 150 passengers. She is of 5,000 tons and her sailing connects with the Dominion Atlantic Railway and so enables tourists to reach Nova Scotia sea and holiday resorts.

This summer will witness a great deal of activity on the part of the grain companies as well as the Wheat Pool in the construction of elevators at country points in Alberta to take care of the larger harvests which are expected. Another company which has just announced its intention to enter on a construction program is the Gillespie Grain Company. According to John Gillespie, president, the firm plans to erect six new elevators each with a capacity of 40,000 bushels.

Musicians under the leadership of Flight Lieutenant John A. Amers, forming the band of the Royal Air Force, Britain's youngest military band, landed recently at Quebec from Canadian Pacific liner Montmartre for a tour of Canada from coast to coast, as did the band of the Coldstream Guards last year. This aggregation was formed in June, 1926, and since then has fulfilled engagements all over the British Isles. The band will play in all the principal centres, military centres and garrison towns of Canada during their tour here.

"First call for dinner!" "Last call for dinner!" The old monotonous warning to the hungry traveller is a thing of the past on the Trans-Canada Limited. C. P. R. trans-continental crack train from Montreal to Vancouver. To-day a neatly attired waiter in white coat and apron with a smart black bow tie walks through the cars ringing "chimes" on a dulcimer, an appeal at once more pleasant to the ear and more likely to attract attention than the former method. In time, there is no doubt, the idea will be adopted on all dining car trains of the railway.

Advertised to make the trip from Montreal to London in nine days, the Canadian Pacific freight ship Beaverbrae actually completed the run in eight days and twenty hours, making record time for a freight vessel between the two ports. This ship is one of the five "Beaver" ships making up the new fast freight steamship service of the Canadian Pacific. They have refrigerated cargo space and are of 10,000 tons dead weight. The service is between Montreal and London, and there is a sailing from the Canadian port every Friday. The vessels as a rule making better time than most passenger vessels on the London route.
