EXONERATED

CHAS FALLOON HELD BLAMELESS IN CONNECTION WITH AUTOMOBILE DEATH

The inquest into the death of William Graham, the young Scotsman killed on the Plank road east of Port Dover on Sunday, May 27th, by an automobile driven by Charles Falloon, a young man of this district, who had been arrested and liberated on bail of \$15,000, was resumed at Port Dover on Monday night under Coroner Dr. W. A. McIntosh of Simcoe.

Through the week the reticence of officials and the consequent enforced reticence of the press gave wide scope for rumor and the most exaggerated stories were going round. Charles Falloon went to Port Dover Monday morning and renewed his bonds and attended the inquest in the evening, when the following verdict was rendered—

That William Graham came to his death on Sunday, May 27th, 1928, on the highway between Port Dover and Jarvis by being struck by a motor car driven by Charles Falloon, and the jurors further say that the accident was due to the loose condition of the crushed stone on the road and the dust formed, thereby obstructing the view ahead and the jurors are of the opinion that the department of highways should build footpaths along provincial highways for the use of pedestrians.

There was absolutely no evidence of racing or jockeying or excessive speeding. There was no evidence of intoxication or of a novice at the wheel. There was absolutely nothing but conjecture upon which to base the unchallenged rumors that became rife. It has all boiled down to this that Charles Falloon will have to answer a charge of operating a motor vehicle without a permit.

Farmers' Week at O. A. C.

COLLEGE AT HOME TO FARMERS FRIENDS FROM ALL PARTS OF PROVINCE ON JUNE 19, 20, 21 AND 22

GENERAL DAILY PROGRAM—Until noon, visitors may spend the time looking about the lawns, flower gardens and vegetable gardens, or going over the exhibits in the buildings of the Science Departments.

LUNCH—A wholesome picnic lunch will be served free in the gymnasium at 12 o'clock.

TOUR FOR MEN—Those interested in farm crops and livestock will leave the gymnasium in charge of a guide immediately after lunch and spend an hour looking over the crop experiment plots; then on to view the swine, beef cattle and dairy cattle for another hour. After that all will be at liberty to visit other departments of the College as they see fit.

TOUR FOR WOMEN—Those interested in Home Economics will leave the gymnasium in charge of a guide immediately after lunch and will go to Macdonald Institute to be shown through the class rooms, laboratories and kitchens, and to view the special exhibits which will be arranged for their benefit. After that they will be at liberty to visit the poultry houses, the dairy, the apiary and the gardens as they prefer.

INFORMATION BUREAU—An Information Bureau will be established in a comfortable, airy room near the gymnasium. Here there will be a supply of bulletins, circulars, etc., on various topics, and copies may be had for the asking. Persons in charge will be glad to give information and to direct visitors to any building or department which they may wish to visit. Besides this, staff officials will be in all buildings from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day, ready to give information on questions of agricultural science and practice.

PUN AND PROLIC—At 4 o'clock the campus will be available to young and old for baseball games, horse-shoe pitching, or such other sports as they may see fit to enjoy.

IS ORDAINED CATHOLIC PRIEST

Rev. Father Kelly Celebrates His First Solemn High Mass at His Home Town, Simcoe, on Sunday Last

Rev. Father Leo Joseph Kelly, B. A., of London Seminary, was ordained a Catholic Priest at St. Peter's Cathedral, London, on Saturday last. His Lordship Bishop McNally, D.D., of Hamilton, officiated at the ordination Mass owing to the illness of His Lordship the Right Rev. M. F. Fallon, Bishop of London. Rev. Father Kelly celebrated his first Solemn High Mass at St. Mary's Catholic Church at his home town, Simcoe, at 10:30 on Sunday last, assisted by Rev. Father Cook of Simcoe as Deacon, Rev. Father Hall of London as Sub-deacon and Rev. E. A. Hannick, Ph.D., Sacred Heart Seminary, Detroit, as Archpriest. Rev. Father Kelly's education as usual in the course of training for

the Catholic Priesthood has extended over a period of ten years since his graduation from Simcoe High School. His course included attendance at Assumption College, Sandwich, St. Thomas College, Chatham, New Brunswick, Peter's Seminary, London, and he has also graduated as a Bachelor of Arts at Western University. Rev. Father L. M. Forristal, B.A., Spiritual Director of St. Peter's Seminary, London, and Professor of Sacred Liturgy, delivered the sermon for the occasion and Father Forristal's pronouncement upon the dignity and the glory of the Catholic Priesthood and its mission for the salvation of souls was indeed a masterpiece which inspired his listeners and was deeply appreciated, especially his eloquent words of congratulations to the young Levite, Father Kelly, to Rev. Father Nagle (his Pastor), to his parents and relatives and to the parishioners.

At the reception given at the home of his father, W. E. Kelly, K.C., Crown Attorney of Norfolk, following the celebration of Solemn High Mass, there was a large attendance of immediate relatives and of visiting Clergy. Many congratulatory messages were received by Rev. Father Kelly with best wishes for his success and many appropriate and valuable gifts were received by him from his friends. The Clergy visited at Port Dover at the Dominion Government Monument erected to the memory of Rev. Father Galline and party who wintered at Port Dover about three hundred years ago. 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Motorist Jailed

HIT & RUN MOTORIST CAUGHT—WILL APPEAR SATURDAY TO ANSWER CHARGE

SIMCOE, June 4.—As a sequel to the smashing of a buggy and the killing of a horse on the Plank road east of Port Dover at 7 o'clock on Friday night, Mike Semple of un-stated residence, was apprehended, arraigned for reckless driving and remanded to Chateau Robertson here on Saturday morning. He will appear at 10 a.m. on Saturday next to answer to whatever charge or charges may then be preferred against him.

Shortly before 12 o'clock Friday night the police magistrate came out from his residence and strolled up to his office. P. C. Wood arrived there about the same time. Presumably the prompt calling out of police all over the district had its effect. Before noon Saturday Constable Wood was back with his quarry. Semple was held up as a suspect at Bridgeburg and was unable to shake off suspicion before P. C. Wood, of Simcoe, arrived there to look him over.

Semple seems to be rather widely known locally and to have many outside acquaintances if one would judge from lingerers about the halls of justice Saturday afternoon and yesterday. One long distance friend pretended surprise that he was unable to get into telephone connection with Semple. The governor was apparently amused with the audacity of this fellow.

Semple, to all appearances, had made desperate attempts to get out of the county.
