GIVEN FINE, JAIL TERM AND DEPORTATION

Fine for Mike Semple, Alleged Hit-and-Run Driver

Mike Semple, 716 West Fifth street Erie, Pa., charged as a hit-and-run motorist who struck a horse and buggy, killing the horse, demolishing the buggy and precipitating Wilson Porter, aged 75, and his 9-year-old granddaughter on to the plank road two miles this side of Port Dover on June 14, and held in custody at Simcoe without bail, was tried and found guilty on Saturday. Through his counsel Semple made restitution in the amount of \$450 before appearing in court.

He was assessed \$200 and costs on the charge of reckless driving and \$100 and costs, plus 30 days in jail, for failing to return to the scene and render assistance.

In case of failure to pay fines and costs there is provided an additional stay of three months in jail, and when his time is served he is to be legally and permanently deported because of entering Canada as a tourist while actually on commercial business. His coupe has been confiscated.

Semple attempted to pass the buggy when he overtook it by passing to the right at the same time as the buggy, which had been traveling on the left side where the track through the stone resurfacing made better going. Evidence went to show that the accused did not slow up but hurried on to Port Dover. He had a broken windshield, a bent visor and damaged port fenders. But he made a U-turn in about two hours where he found Provincial Constable Hough awaiting for him at the bridge.
