Haldimand's Grand Old Man Passes

CHARLES E. BOURNE DIES AT AGE OF 93 YEARS—HAD A REMARKABLE CAREER

Haldimand county's grand old man, Charles Edward Bourne, passed away in Grimsby on Tuesday, June 19th, at the home of his son, G. G. Bourne, Adelaide street.

The deceased was born in London, England, 93 years ago. He came to Canada with his parents at the age of two years, they making their home in St. Anne's, Que., afterwards moving to Ancaster, Ont., where he attended Dr. Tassie's school, Galt.

At the age of 18 years he moved to Nanticoke, Ont., where he was appointed harbor-master, and a notary public, moving to Jarvis in 1879.

Mr. Bourne was one of the oldest division court clerks in Ontario, holding this position, as well as justice of the peace, for 64 1/2 years.

He was a member of the Anglican Synod of the Diocese of Toronto until the formation of the Diocese of Niagara, and had been a delegate to the Niagara Synod continuously since its formation 50 years ago. Mr. Bourne had won distinction of only missing one meeting in this time. He was a staunch Conservative and a member of the I.O.O.F., being Past Noble Grand.

His wife pre-deceased him 19 years ago. Surviving are two daughters and three sons: Mrs. F. J. Falls, Jarvis and Miss Carrie at home, Jarvis; Chas. H., of Chicago, G. G. and A. B. of Grimsby, Ontario.

The remains were brought to his home in Jarvis and the funeral service was held at St. Paul's Anglican church, Jarvis, on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with interment in the churchyard adjoining.
