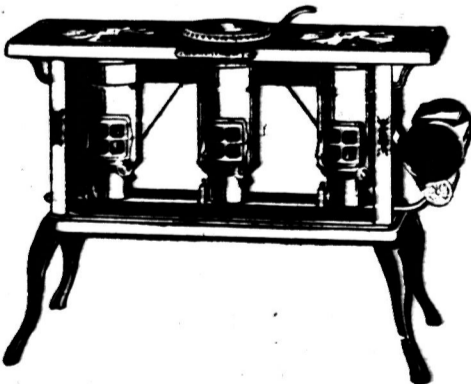

next meeting.  
5. Selkirk Bridge No. 9, stone to be put on at each end of bridge, stone work to be pointed up, bridge painted and new floor and railings. Town Line Rainham and Walpole.

6. Varenay Bridge No. 11, stone to be put on at north end of bridge, dirt removed from the floor. County Line 7. Parsons Bridge No. 12, new railings, also a few new planks.

8. Walker Bridge No. 13, stonework to be pointed and dirt removed from floor.

9. Hartford Bridge No. 15, new plank floor.

10. Vsnloon Bridge No. 16, new railings, stone at one end of bridge, dirt removed from the floor.

11. Kees Bridge No. 17, railings repaired, remove dirt from the floor.

12. New 9, 11, 12, 13, 15, 16 and 17 to be looked after by Mr. Shoup.

13. We recommend the payment of the following accounts:

### REPORT OF GOOD ROADS COMMITTEE

1. We have examined the pay lists and accounts submitted by the Superintendent and recommend that they be paid.

2. Would recommend that the account from W. Clark for damages to car on County Road 14 be referred to the Committee of the Whole.

3. Would recommend that the quotations from C. E. Fiebig for 4-inch lump steam coal, delivered on County Roads Nos. 11 and 12 in our supply wagons from the Norfolk Line to Rainham Centre, and from Fisherville to end of metal in South Cayuga, price \$9.50 per ton, be accepted.

4. Roger M. Lee, O.L.S., D.L.S., accompanied by Superintendent made a very careful examination of the Dennis Bridge over Sandusk Creek, and submitted the following report:

The present bridge has a waterway of approximately 59 ft., with a roadway of about 13 ft., and was built in the neighborhood of 45 years ago. The abutments are of stone and the truss of cast iron and floor and joist of wood. The west end of the trusses are resting considerably behind the abutments, which has resulted in a bad settling at the southwest corner, it being one foot below the other bearings. The northern truss in consequence is badly out of vertical, which impairs its strength.

Mr. Lee therefore considers that this bridge is unsafe for modern traffic and for hauling stone over it with trucks.

Mr. Lee recommended that a new bridge be constructed, to have a 70 ft. waterway and an 19 ft. roadway. The cost of this structure would be as follows:

Steel superstructure and concrete floor... \$4500  
Abutments and the engineering fees... 475

Your committee would recommend that Mr. Lee be asked to prepare the plans and specifications for a bridge of above type and that we ask tenders for building this new structure, and that the committee be empowered to accept a tender and proceed with the construction of the bridge, in order that it may be completed to haul the stone over it to complete the macadam base from the bridge to the Cheapside sidewalk.

Would recommend that debentures be issued to cover the cost of this structure, and also the County's share of Caledonia bridge.

5. Would recommend that the petition from the residents and ratepayers of the townships of Rainham and South Cayuga be laid over, and fill for the present.

Mr. Best started to operate his quarry on May 7th, and on May 31st had delivered 2240 yards of stone, completing 2 1/2 miles of road from the Village of Selkirk to Cheapside sidewalk in Walpole.

Mr. Gilmore commenced to operate his quarry May 29th, and on May 31st had delivered on Road No. 11, 214 tons of stone, commencing at the west side of Dennis Bridge.

6. Would recommend that the superintendent be authorized to ship one car of mixed stone (3/4 in. and screenings) to repair any road he considers necessary.

Would recommend that Mr. Lee be asked to make a survey of the curve in the road along Dry Branch Creek, and submit a plan to the committee as soon as possible, so that the metalling will not be held up.

Wingfield-Honsberger—That the report of the Good Roads Committee be adopted as read. Lost.

Colter-Kern—In amendment—that the report of the Good Roads Committee be amended, and that all the references to issuing of debentures for county bridge purposes be eliminated, and that with such amendment the report be adopted as read. Carried.

The mill rate for 1928 will be for General Purposes 14 mills, and for Good Roads 5 mills.

HOME COMMITTEE REPORT

Your Home Committee met at the House of Refuge on June 4th and report as follows:

There are at present 36 inmates—21 males and 15 females. John Follick was removed to Haldimand Memorial Hospital, where he has since died. Mrs. Howard has been discharged in care of her brother.

We authorized the purchase of a barrel sprayer and supplies for the same at a cost of \$62, and the interior of the barn and chicken pen have been thoroughly whitewashed and the fruit trees sprayed.

We also authorized the purchase of 100 baby chicks, Barred Rocks, at a cost of \$14, and the erection of a brooder house, Mr. Gardiner doing the work.

We have examined the accounts of the Home and Children's Aid Society and find them correct, and recom-

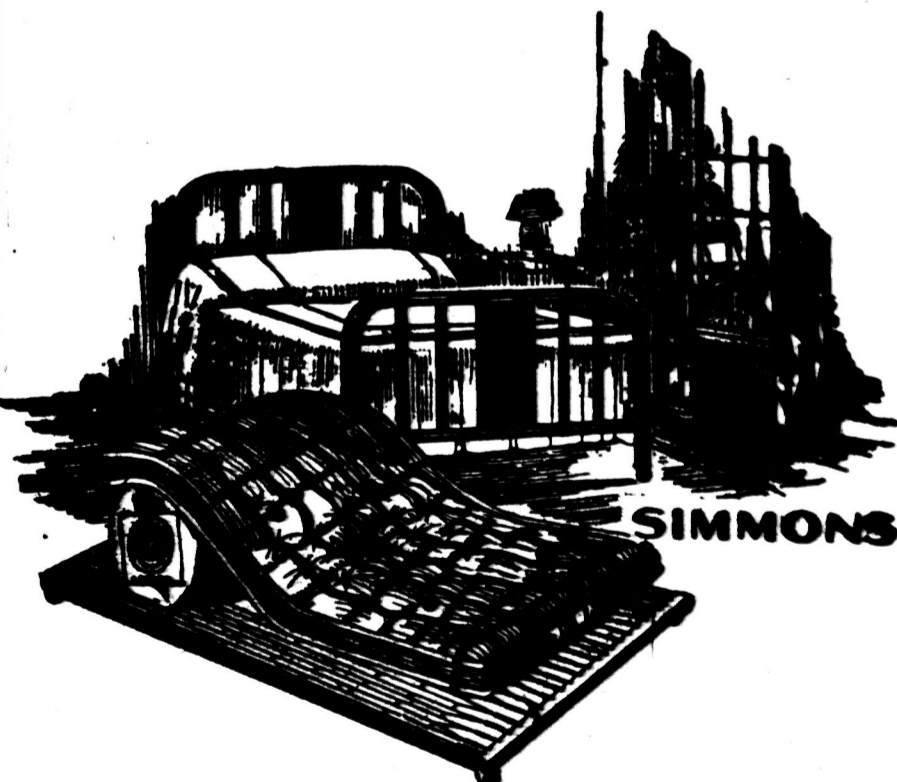
