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Dominion Day at Erie Beach July 2

Elaborate plans for the observation of Dominion Day, July 2nd, have been made by the Councils of the various counties along the Niagara Peninsula, to be held at Erie Beach. While the plans are still incomplete the program will be one of patriotic events with games and competitive events for the men, women and children.

The counties who will participate are Welland, Haldimand, Lincoln and Wentworth, and it is expected that thousands of residents of each will be on hand to enjoy the entertainment and the attractions at the beautiful beach, which is situated on Lake Erie at the entrance of Niagara. Only a short distance from the historic peace bridge between Port Erie and Buffalo, and as celebrating in a patriotic way the great National Holiday, "Dominion Day."

W. W. Frey of Dunnville, as chairman of the speakers committee, has secured for the speaker, the Hon. George S. Henry, Ontario Minister of Highways, who will deliver the address of the day. The topic will be patriotic, laying the nucleus for a greater Dominion Day Celebration each year.

Tentative plans call for a tug of war between teams from each of the four counties, the prize to the winner being a handsome trophy. A horse-shoe pitching contest, too, is expected to excite considerable interest. There will be an extensive program of other competitive events.

Band concerts afternoon and evening by the Kilties Band will be among the entertainment features and the celebration will conclude with a magnificent display of fireworks at night. Erie Beach is the largest amusement park in Ontario and is equipped with every modern amusement ride. It includes a park bordering on the lake nearly a mile in length, its park is one of natural beauty. A concrete promenade 15 feet wide runs parallel to the shore line and is three-quarters of a mile in length.

There is no admission to the park or beach and there are parking accommodations for more than 5000 automobiles within the park property.

MARY SOPHIA AWDE

Mary Sophia Awde, the youngest daughter of the late James Awde, was born in the township of Westpole on September 11th, 1837. She became the wife of Mr. Thos. Parkinson and most of her married life was spent in the beautiful home now occupied by her son Guy. Here her four sons and two daughters were born. About nine years ago she and Mr. Parkinson moved to Hagersville, where she had many friends and lived very happily until Mr. Parkinson's sudden death three years later.

The shock of his death seriously affected Mrs. Parkinson's health, which was never too robust, and selling her Hagersville home she made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Andrew Meehan, and here on the farm on which she was born, she passed peacefully away on Sunday morning, June 17th, 1928.

Mrs. Parkinson was a consistent member of Garnet church always in so far as her health permitted, present at the services and cheerfully taking her part in all church work. Her

quiet inoffensive disposition and kind gentle manner endeared her to all who knew her.

The funeral services were ably conducted by the Rev. H. Brand, assisted by the Garnet choir. The many very beautiful floral offerings and the unusually large funeral cortege of sorrowing friends, neighbors and relatives, testified to the high regard in which the deceased was held. The remains were tenderly borne to the last resting place in Hagersville cemetery, her four sons and two sons-in-law acting as pallbearers.

She leaves to mourn the passing of a real mother, four sons and two daughters, viz: Guy E. Charles and William J. of Walpole; Clair A., of Toronto; Mrs. S. Smith, of Brantford and Mrs. Andrew Meehan of Walpole. Thirteen grandchildren and two, sisters, Mrs. Hewson of Jarvis and Mrs. Darley of Wilsonburg and one brother, George, also mourn her loss.
