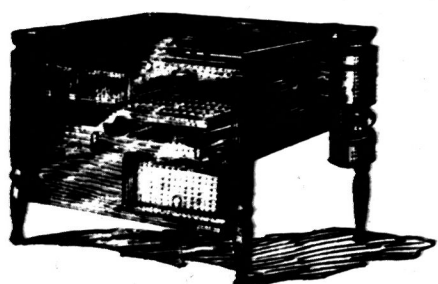

FEBRUARY HAS AN EXTRA DAY

Julius Caesar Responsible for Leap Year — Nearly Every Country Has Superstitions About Year

There were 29 days in February, this being leap year. A leap year is one whose number in the Christian era can be divided by four without remainder, every year—1900, and so on, being excepted.

The necessity for leap year lies in the fact that the solar year consists of 365 days, five hours, 48 minutes, and therefore perfect readjustment is necessary.

It was in the year B.C. 46 that Julius Caesar introduced the leap year, or what is generally known as leap year, into the calendar. Previous to the adoption of the Julian system, the Roman year consisted of 304 days only, divided into 12 lunar months, with an occasional intercalary month to make up for the fact that more than 12 exact lunar months are required to complete the natural year.

This system was very unsatisfactory, and Julius Caesar much improved matters by his calendar which made each year to consist of 365 1/4 days on the average by inserting another day every four years, between February 24 and 25.

This reckoning was not quite accurate, however, and when Pope Gregory XIII studied the matter in 1582, he found there was a difference of 10 days between the Julian and the natural time. This led to the Gregorian Amendment, which enacted that what would have been October, 5, 1582, was to be regarded as October 15th.

To guard against future discrepancies the Pope drew up a list of leap years, and although 1700, 1800 and 1900 were not included, 2000 to propose during leap year, there is now only a difference of 22 seconds per annum between calendar and the natural time.

The Gregorian Amendment was not accepted by England until 1751, by which time the difference between the Julian calendar and natural time had become 11 days. A decree was issued to meet the case, and September 3, 1751, became September 14.

THE LIFE OF A TOWN

An inkling of the great significance of newspaper advertising has been discovered, a newspaper enthusiast, which recently came out with the following:

"No business man in any town should allow a newspaper published in his town to go without his name and business being mentioned somewhere in its columns. This applies to all kinds of business and professional men. This does not mean you should have a whole, half or a quarter of a page ad in each issue of the paper, but your name and business should be mentioned, if you do not use more than a two-line space. A stranger picking up a newspaper, should be able to tell what business is represented in a town by looking at a paper. This is the best possible town advertiser. The man who does not advertise his business does an injustice to himself and to the town. The man who insists on sharing the business which comes to town, but refuses to advertise his own, is not a valuable addition to his town. The life of a town is dependent upon the live, wide-awake and liberal advertising business man."

Here and There

Quebec City was on the latter part of a week on the return to his native city of his Honorable Raymond E. Beaudry, newly created Senator. Beaudry, a member of the Liberal Party, was elected in 1925. He is a member of the Senate of the province of Quebec.

Four hundred thousand visitors from the United States will be touring the highways of the province of Quebec this year, according to the vice-president of the Royal Automobile Club of Canada, interviewed at the Chamber of Commerce, Quebec, this month. It is estimated they will spend over sixty million dollars in the province this coming season.

Edmonton.—Sale of the Lacrosse and Northwestern Railway to the Canadian Pacific Railway to be completed by the Provincial Premier. The C.P.R. agrees to indemnify the province against future liability on outstanding 5 per cent. bonds for \$275,700 and, in addition, pay—\$1,500,000 in cash, at the same time, undertaking to construct a 20-mile extension within the next three years.

Calgary.—The Province of Alberta exported goods to the value of \$9,120,385 to the United States during the year 1927, according to the annual report of S. C. Root, United States Consul for Calgary district. The total exports show an increase of \$764,660 or 7 per cent. over 1926. Cattle and hogs held a conspicuous place in these exports, the former amounting to \$1,215,626 and the latter to \$682,945.

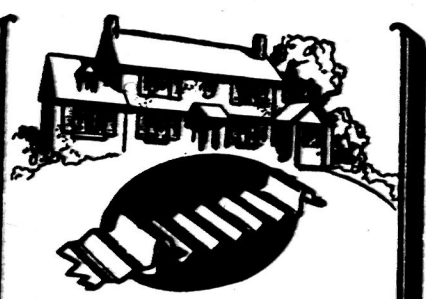
Winnipeg.—Homestead entries made in the four western provinces in the calendar year 1927 totalled 6,447, as compared with 6,012 the year before—an increase of 7.25 per cent. Entries by provinces in 1927 figures being in brackets—were: Manitoba 719 (942), Saskatchewan 2,819 (2,780), Alberta 2,736 (2,166) and British Columbia 113 (124). Deceased filings totalled 488, an increase of 69 with Manitoba 46 (54), Saskatchewan 221 (219), Alberta 215 (138) and British Columbia 6 (7).

Thirteen new ocean liners, at least, of a total of 123,000 gross tons, are expected in Montreal during the coming season. Of this total Canadian Pacific vessels make up more than half, or 60,000 gross tons. These are the "Duchess of Athol" and the "Duchess of Bedford", of 20,000 gross tons each, and the five Canadian Pacific freighters, the "Beaverburn", "Beaverhill", "Beaverdale", "Beaverdam" and "Beaverdale", each of 10,000 gross tons.

Saint John.—The Harbor Commissioners have now drawn up a \$10,000,000 project of port development, to extend over a 5-year period, subject to the approval of the Minister of Marine. The general scheme includes the construction of one grain conveyor gallery at pier No. 7; a grain jetty, 1250 feet long; a pier, 1250 feet long and equipped with four one-storey, fireproof sheds and shipping office; one grain elevator of 2,400,000 bushels capacity with main conveyor; wharves for ice, the grain pier No. 7 and the necessary railway tracks, wharves, sewage facilities and water supply to serve the new works.

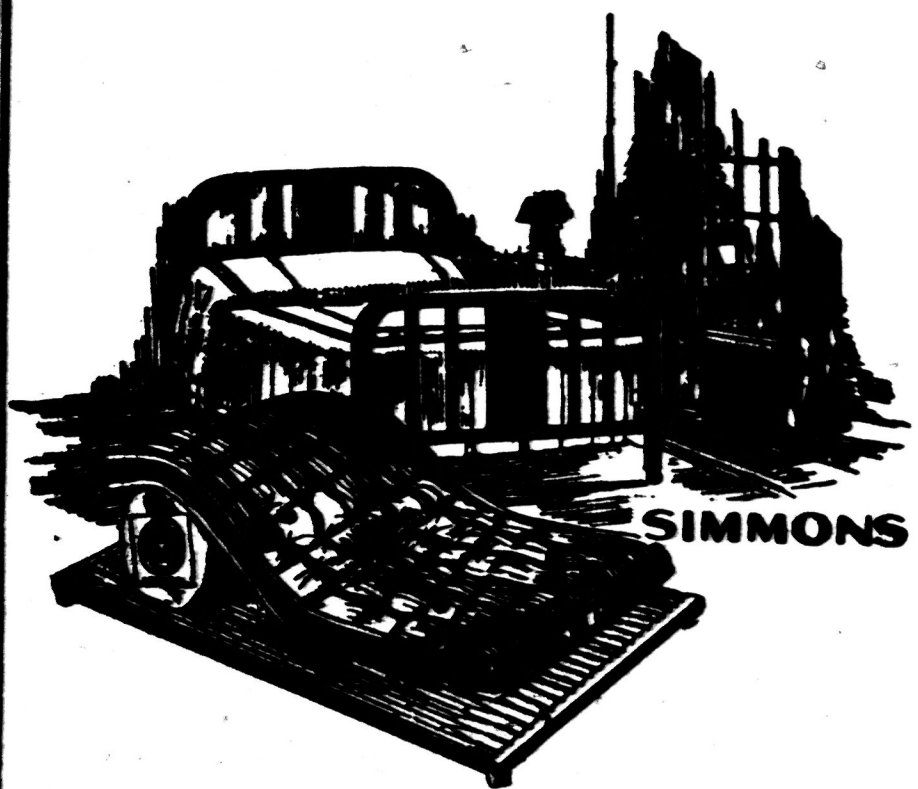
