MOTHER'S DAY, MAY 13 AT THE CHURCHES

Mother's Day. All over the Dominion and perhaps in many other places, that terrestrial saint will become the objects of men's homage and veneration.

There is a dispute in progress as to who originated the idea. For the rest of us that is unimportant. But it is easy to understand why any person responsible for so inspiring a thought should cherish the credit for it and yet nothing could be more unlike a mother than to squabble about whose was the credit.

One need only consult one's own experiences and seek in vain to recall a single instance when mother sought credit for the service and love she bore her kin. The home may have looked especially tidy, the meal may have been unusually tasty the covers might have been tucked with special care, the sick room may have been comforted by her almost divine presence, yet not in a single instance did she claim credit for it. Mothers find their satisfaction in something else.

It will be an odd son and daughter who permit Sunday to pass without some message, some greeting to the living mother or without some loving remembrance to the mother dead. From the motherless everywhere to the mothered child anywhere goes the counsel to dedicate Sunday to her honor and her service.

AN ENJOYABLE EVENING SPENT AT ERIE LODGE

Over one hundred brethren of the Craft attended the regular meeting of Erie Lodge, A. F. & A. M., No. 149, on Monday evening last, it being the occasion of the official visit of the D. D. G. M., Rt. Wor. Bro. Jas. E. Biddle, of Port Rowan. The visitor was introduced by Rt. Wor. Bro. Jas. R. Waddle, P. D. D. G. M. and was also accompanied during the ceremonies of introduction by Rt. Wor. Bro. J. J. Parson, P. D. D. G. M. of Brant district. Before the close of the meeting, R. W. Bro. Biddle spoke in glowing terms of the manner in which the work has been exemplified, and he took a few minutes to give the brethren some interesting Masonic history that was of exceptional interest to all.

Adjournment was then made to the town hall, where lunch had been prepared (under the auspices of the Port Dover Women's Institute). This was followed by a very enjoyable sing-song, led by W. M. Bro. Jos. Lamb, and then came a number of addresses that were brimful of good things for the fraternity. Rt. Wor. Bro. Biddle led off, with a talk that gave interesting facts and figures and timely comparisons of the work of Grand Lodge, as shown today and also during the early days, which went to show that the Brethren had every reason to be proud of the

work that has been undertaken in the past, and which is now being carried out on a most gigantic scale. To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Hon. John S. Martin, the speaker paid tribute.

Rt. Wor. Bro. Jas. R. Waddle, who is so often referred to in Masonic assemblies as one of "big men of the Craft" and the man who is responsible for the enviable position of Erie Lodge, Port Dover, gave a brief review of the work as D. D. G. M. some twenty-two years ago. He also emphasized the important role and high ideals, and still further opportunities of service that confronted the members of the Craft; concluding with a most timely and appropriate explanation of the word "Charity," which will give those present something to ponder over for a considerable time.

Rt. Wor. Bro. J. J. Parsons gave an excellent talk. He also added his word of appreciation of the high manner in which W. Bro. Lamb and officers had carried out their duties.

V. Wor. Bro. Cornish gave a short but nevertheless interesting talk, and was followed by Bro. Parsons who, in turn, introduced to the gathering that great statesman and model man of our sister town of Jarvis—the Wor. Bro. George L. Miller. Mr. Miller, who is never at a loss for words on such an occasion, was taken a little aback, but responded nobly to such a glowing introduction. He, too, paid his tribute to Erie Lodge and W. Bro. Jos. Lamb. Comparing times with the present occasion he was sure that great strides had been made, and the prospects ahead were full of hope for the noble Order.

R. W. Bro. Anderson, Port Rowan (district secretary) thought Erie Lodge had carried out the work exceedingly well, and the large attendance of out-of-town Brethren was the best evidence that Erie lodge enjoyed an enviable reputation far and wide.

Wor. Bro. C. Ryerse, of Norfolk lodge, offered services of the members of his lodge on any and all occasions, and Bro. Douglas Stalker, Simcoe, also gave a short address.

A vote of thanks to the ladies was proposed by V. W. Bro. Bond and seconded by R. W. Bro. Parsons. The meeting closed with Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem.—Pt. Dover Maple Leaf.
