The Late Jobez Stallwood

Robert Jabez Stallwood, who was fatally injured by his team in Hagersville on Saturday, April 21st, and died about six hours later in St. Joseph's hospital, Hamilton, was the eldest son of the late Jabez Stallwood, of Oneida. He was born May 28th, 1858.

He spent his public school days in Caledonia and Hamilton, after which he attended Victoria University in Cobourg. Received his B.A. degree in 1902, attended the school of Paedagogy in Toronto, and then went West. At school he belonged to the Queen's Own Rifles and upon the outbreak of the Boer war went to Kingston for further training.

After three months in England returned to Canada, went to Northern Ontario where for several years he was connected with the Provincial police force. About the year 1910, deceased decided to live upon his land, 320 acres (Stallwood Camp) beautifully situated on Long Lake.

After the outbreak of the Great War and the Country kept calling its men, although beyond military age yet because of his training he felt it his duty to offer his services. At once received a Lieutenantcy with orders to recruit a Northern Battalion (228th Battalion). Before going to France a winter was spent in Hamilton training a machine gun section.

Returning to Northern Ontario, his old enemy, the fire fiend, swept away his property in Charlton and left him timbered land a waste of blackened stumps.

He returned to his native county and settled upon a farm in the first concession of Walpole. Here he hoped through industry and clean habits coupled with an indomitable will to soon become an independent farmer. Besides his widow (Miss Marjorie

Manchester, England) Jabez Stallwood is survived by three children, Patricia, Bennie and Anthony, five sisters and four brothers. John Neil, of Cheapside, assisted by Rev. E. W. Brearley, Hagersville, conducted the funeral service at the home of his sister, Mrs. Slack Hagersville, and also at Greenwood cemetery, Springvale. Officers of the "Haldimand Rifles" and "County Volunteer Corps" were present at the funeral, and instead of firearms their arms bore the floral gifts, a fitting token to a man who was really a quiet peace-loving man.
