She was rushed to medical attendance, but the doctors were unable to revive the lifeless form. The funeral of the little child was held on Monday.

Report on Home of Refuge

The report on conditions at the County House of Refuge, submitted to the County Council by a committee appointed for that purpose was submitted at the last meeting, and it is not very complimentary in regard to conditions at that institution. Apparently the investigation was fully justified, and it is to be expected, now that the Council has the facts before it that steps will be taken without delay to remedy conditions. This is what the electors of the county will expect. The report is as follows—

Your committee fully realized its responsibility in the matter and certain direct charges had been made and rumors had been circulated throughout the County, we felt it our duty to visit other Industrial Homes.

On 15th February we went to Simcoe, Brantford and Hamilton and in March we visited the Homes at Welland and St. Catharines. The conditions are to be congratulated on the manner in which their Managers and Matrons carry on their work. Everything in the Homes were clean, neat and well cared for, and the inmates were clean and happy. The barns and outbuildings were well looked after, and their cattle and horses (wee credit to the management).

On March 23rd we held our investigation in the Orange Hall at Dunnville, where we heard charges and examined witnesses. We then visited the Home and we find as follows:

1. The inmates have received the best of medical attention. The Medical Officer has received his salary of \$200.00 per year and in addition he has charged for medicine at the same rate as he charges his own patients for re-fills. There has been no overcharging on the part of this officer, and we believe he has carried on his duties honestly, efficiently and in the interests of the inmates and the County. In some of the other homes a dispensary is maintained in others, the medical officer prescribes and the prescription is filled at the drug stores. We would not recommend the placing of a dispensary in our Home, as the cost would be kept in stock, it would be dangerous to have the Manager fill a prescription and the medicines would in time become useless. We would recommend that the medical officer should supply the drugs, but that he should prescribe and the prescriptions be filled at a drug store. This procedure would eliminate any suspicion.

2. The inmates in our Home are clean, well cared for and contented, but we are sorry to report that the general conditions cannot compare with conditions in the other Homes we visited. There does not seem to be to be the same atmosphere of a homelike condition as we find in the other places.

There is not a proper segregation of the male and female patients. Our Manager blames this to the fact that only in the men's part of the basement is there any sink for taking care of the waste water, but we feel that under no circumstances should a female inmate be allowed in the men's section, and the proper oversight. In all other Homes the segregation of inmates is considered a very important matter and is carefully guarded by the officials. It should be done in our Home.

Some of the walls and ceilings have been peeling this winter, but much more should have been done. There is sufficient help maintained in the Home to do practically all of this work, and the buildings both inside and outside should be maintained in a manner that any ratepayer could visit and be proud of it.

A proper urinal or urinals should be installed in the men's section of the basement.

The kitchen and dining rooms are not as clean or well cared for as they should be. The pantry and refrigerator are in a very poor condition.

Cayuga, Thursday, May 10. Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present with the Warden in the chair.

4. Letter from Mothers' Allowance Commission with list of beneficiaries for March.

5. Letter from Mothers' Allowance asking that the council suggest two names as members of Local Board for the coming year.

6. Letter from Lt.-Col. Heaslip asking County Council to appoint two family officials to act in connection with disposing of the 114th Battalion colors in the court house.

A by-law moved by Mr. Miller and seconded by Mr. McDonald, fixing the salary of the county auditors at \$150 each, payable at the end of the year was given its three readings, signed, sealed and numbered and carried.
