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WIFE OF FOUNDER OF JARVIS RECORD DIES

A quiet but impressive funeral service on Monday morning marked the close of the life of Mrs. Margaret Pettit, a well-known and deeply respected resident of Toronto, who died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Lela Craig, in her 80th year.

Although she had been in impaired health she was always genial and able to be around till death came peacefully. Her unfailing cheerfulness and her consideration for the comfort and happiness of others earned her a very wide circle of acquaintances, who invariably admired her kindly spirit and amiable manner. The profuse floral tributes around her casket provided silent evidence to the memory and esteem of a kind-hearted soul. She was born in Simcoe. Her husband, Mr. Frank N. Pettit, was the founder and editor of the Jarvis Record and editor of the Delhi Reporter for many years.

The remains were conveyed to Goodwood, where the deceased lived for some years. The funeral service was held in the United Church and conducted by Rev. Mr. Otton. Interment took place in the family plot at Goodwood cemetery, where the remains were laid to rest beside those of her late husband and daughter.

Her immediate survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Lela Craig; four grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and one sister, Miss Minnie Griffin.

Hit By Car; Instantly Killed

Wm. Graham, Recently From Scotland, Meets Death on Road Near Port Dover

William Graham, aged 21 years, who came to Canada from Scotland only about three weeks ago, was killed on Sunday afternoon about 4 p.m. when struck by a motor car.

The fatality occurred on what is known as the Plank road, between Port Dover and Jarvis, in Woodhouse Township, Norfolk County. Graham had stepped out of the way of a passing car which caused a cloud of

dust to arise. Apparently he did not notice a second car approaching, and the driver of the latter declares that in the dust he did not see the pedestrian until it was too late to miss hitting him. The driver of the car which caused the death of the young man is Charles Fallon, son of William Fallon, neighbor of Neil Elliott, by whom Graham was employed. The young man, it is said, was killed almost instantly.

The body was taken to Port Dover where an inquest was to be held on Monday morning, which was postponed for a week.

C. N. R. WILL RAISE BRIDGE AT PT. DOVER TO GIVE 12 FT. CLEARANCE

Canadian National Railways Undertake to Raise Present Bridge to Give a Twelve-Foot Clearance For Boats But Will Not Replace Present Bridge With Swing Bridge—Work Will Cost \$2,400 and Expense Will All Be Borne By Company—Council Was Asked to Assume 50% of Cost.

At last! The Canadian National Railway bridge over the creek is to be raised to allow the use of the "flats" by the fishing craft. For a number of years this has been a contentious question in the port and deputation after deputation has waited upon various officials to get action from the railway company to put in a swing bridge in place of the present low, permanent structure that has been holding up the expansion of the fishing interests; but so far without success. At times half-hearted promises of action have been given that the matter would be considered, with the same ultimate result. However, with his usual tact and perseverance, Reeve Misner has been quietly hammering away and it will come as good news to the citizens of the port, and more especially to the fishing interests who are so vitally interested, to learn that the Railway Company will raise the bridge, giving a 12 foot clearance, which will allow much of the local craft to get through without any danger.

In his letter to Reeve Misner under date May 10th, R. H. Fish, general superintendent of the central region of the railway, says: "Referring to your letter of April 12th in connection with raising our bridge at Port Dover to enable bigger boats to pass under same. I have had my engineers look into this matter again, without an enormous expense, the best we could do is raise the bridge to 12 feet clearance. This would necessitate raising our

track 2 feet, thereby increasing the grade, driving double pile bent in the southerly channel and putting in smaller girders. This would give additional clearance of 2 feet, or a total of 12 feet clearance.

I understand from your letter that you require at least 14 feet, but the 12 feet clearance is satisfactory would be glad if you would advise. Might say that clearance between the double bent and the south piles would be about 12 feet, but this may not be wide enough to permit boats to pass under bridge.

The approximate cost of raising the bridge to give clearance of 12-ft. would be \$2,400.00 and I presume that the township or other parties concerned will be agreeable to bearing 50% of this expense. Will you kindly let me hear from you by return mail?"

The last paragraph of the letter was a big surprise to the members of our village council, and after very carefully considering same they instructed that a letter be sent to the General Superintendent pointing out that in their opinion it was purely a matter for the C.N.R. and that the council had no right to undertake to pay a portion of the expense incurred. In acknowledging receipt of this communication, Mr. Fish replies that his company will undertake the work and will proceed as soon as they can.

The Reeve has also been in touch with the C.N.R. authorities with regard to providing more facilities for the accommodation of cars using the ferry line, and in this matter Mr. Fish promises immediate attention.

WORK ON PORT DOVER HARBOR TO BE STARTED IMMEDIATELY

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT TAKE ACTION TO ENSURE PRELIMINARY WORK NECESSARY FOR FERRY SERVICE IS COMPLETED BEFORE JUNE 15—WILL SPEND \$2000.00 ON A FENDER GUARD—NEW EAST PIER AWAITS SANCTION OF PARLIAMENT TO PASS ESTIMATES SAYS W. H. TAYLOR.

Work on the Port Dover harbor is to commence at once, in order that everything may be in readiness for the opening of the ferry service.

The department of public works has sanctioned an immediate expenditure of \$2,000 for the placing of fender piles to keep the boats of the Nicholson-Erie-Dover Ferry line off the western guard pier of the ferry slip. This work will be carried out by day labor, under a local superintendent.

W. H. Taylor, M.P., who was in the village last Saturday, stated that while the estimates were going through the House at an exceeding slow pace this year, he felt confident that the
