NO PANACEA FOR RECKLESSNESS

Both sides have been heard on the equestion of compulsory automobile Liability incurance. The discussion has been in progress for several years producing in recent months little or sno arguments.

Advocates of the scheme advance the suuggestion that it will only assure recompense for those injured or whose property has been damaged in automobile accidents, but will also tend to make drivers more careful. Opponents, however, argue that the wost of the insurance would be excessively high, that the courts would be clogged with lawsuits, that the r'an would increase careless driving rather than curb it, and that it would not always provide proper indemnity tte injured persons.

The argument that a compulsory Latility law would tend to curb reck. less driving seems to be fallacious. The reckless driver is reckless whether he carries insurance or is uninsured. The fact that an automobile is insured against liability means that legal responsibility is shifted only so far as civil actions are concerned. The driver involved in an accident, no matter how much insurance he carries. is answerable to the police.

No one should drive unless he or his employer is able to pay for dam. ages he may cause, and insurance is the cheapest way to purchase such protection. But there are thousands of automobile owners and drivers who are financially irresponsible, and smong them are many reckless drivers. These latter inspire the agitation for compulsory automobile insurance.
