## NOT LOCAL GAS COMPANY

The purchase has been announced of the Cities Service Corporation of New York of the lands and business of the Sterling Gas Company of Port Colborne, which has supplied that district with natural gas for the last 21 years. The new owners have extensive holdings in Ontario, including the Dominion Natural Gas Co. Ltd., the United Gas Company, St. Catharines and Thorold and the Brantford Gas Company. The addition of the Sterling holdings it is claimed makes Cities Service the controllers of the largest group of gas companies in Ontario. The Sterling Gas Company was capitalized at \$600,000. The local branch of the Gas Company is not affected in the present deal.

It has also been announced by officials of the Dominion Natural Gas Company that they have offered to purchase the artificial and municipally owned gas plant of St. Thomas and erect a huge coking and by-product plant at Port Stanley, costing \$2,000,000. Gas would be manufactured at the new plant and mixed with the natural gas at present supplied. In this way it is stated the available natural gas supply would be increased.

Municipal officials of Port Stanley, St. Thomas and London, are all reported to be interested, and it is stated that the large plants would ensure cheaper fuel and gas in that area, as well as giving a decided impetus to the industrial development of Port Stanley—Sachem.

## Rev. Dr. Marsh Preached

The government of Bermuda are about to establish in that colony an observatory which will be an important link in the chain of the world's greatest observatories.

A special committee of the Bermudian parliament has recommended that the Rev. Dr. Marsh, F.R.S.E., now stationed at Jarvis, be asked to supervise its construction, purchase and install the instruments, and be its first director.

During the years of Dr. Marsh's residence in Bermuda as pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, in addition to his church work, he practically filled the office of astronomer, royal and meteorologist, as well as a seismologist.

While Dr. Marsh is much interested in this kind of work and is adept at it, those who know him best think it would be difficult for him to separate himself from the full work of the church. Were he taking such a position, the Presbyterian church in Canada would suffer a loss in its ministry.

Dr. Marsh is well known in Hamilton, having lectured here many times. During his residence in Hamilton, from 1905 to 1912, his private observatory on Aberdeen avenue, was the mecca for all those interested in astronomy, and it was due to his efforts that the present branch of the Royal Astronomical society was established, he being its first president. ## ADMITTS HE SHOT EMPLOYEES INJURED MAN WILL RECOVER

Rozell, deaf mute, held on a vagrancy charge as a result of the wounding by shooting of John Hartnett, at Moore Settlement, near here, on Saturday night, is reported to have confessed the shooting to Provincial Officer H. Feil. The police claim to have obtained a written statement.

In the confession Rozell is said to have admitted that he shot the 24-year-old Canboro man because Hartnett had been drinking and ill-treating Mrs. Dallas Mae Bateman, housekeeper for Hartnett. In the statement, according to the police, Rozell declares that he left the house to go to the barn to finish the chores. He declares that he obtained a rusty old shotgun at the barn and then lay in wait outside the house until Hartnett appeared at the door. He denies that he had any intention of killing his employer.

Rozell was hired man for Hartnett and there is said to have been some ill feeling between the men in connection with Mrs. Bateman, who is a native of Bailieboro, Ont.

Hartnett was seriously injured about the face by the shotgun charge, but he will recover, although it is expected that he will be disfigured for life.

Rozell is still held on a charge of vagrancy, but it is expected that a more serious charge will be laid later. He will appear in court on Thursday morning.
