DROWNS HERSELF WHILE IN DEMENTED CONDITION

Early on Wednesday morning word reached the village of the untimely death of Miss Emily Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Martin Sr., of the Township of Walpole.

Miss Martin had not been enjoying good health for some time and while in a demented condition, threw herself into a well near the house, death resulting from drowning.

Miss Martin, who was in her 34th year came to Canada in the year 1913 with her parents from England, settling on the farm purchased by her father on the Stage Road. She leaves to mourn her aged father and mother and two brothers, both residents of Walpole Township.

The funeral will take place from the home of her parents at 2 p.m. on Friday, November 16th and proceed to St. Paul's Anglican church, Jarvis, for service and interment.

Every Hour Filled For "Royal" Visitors

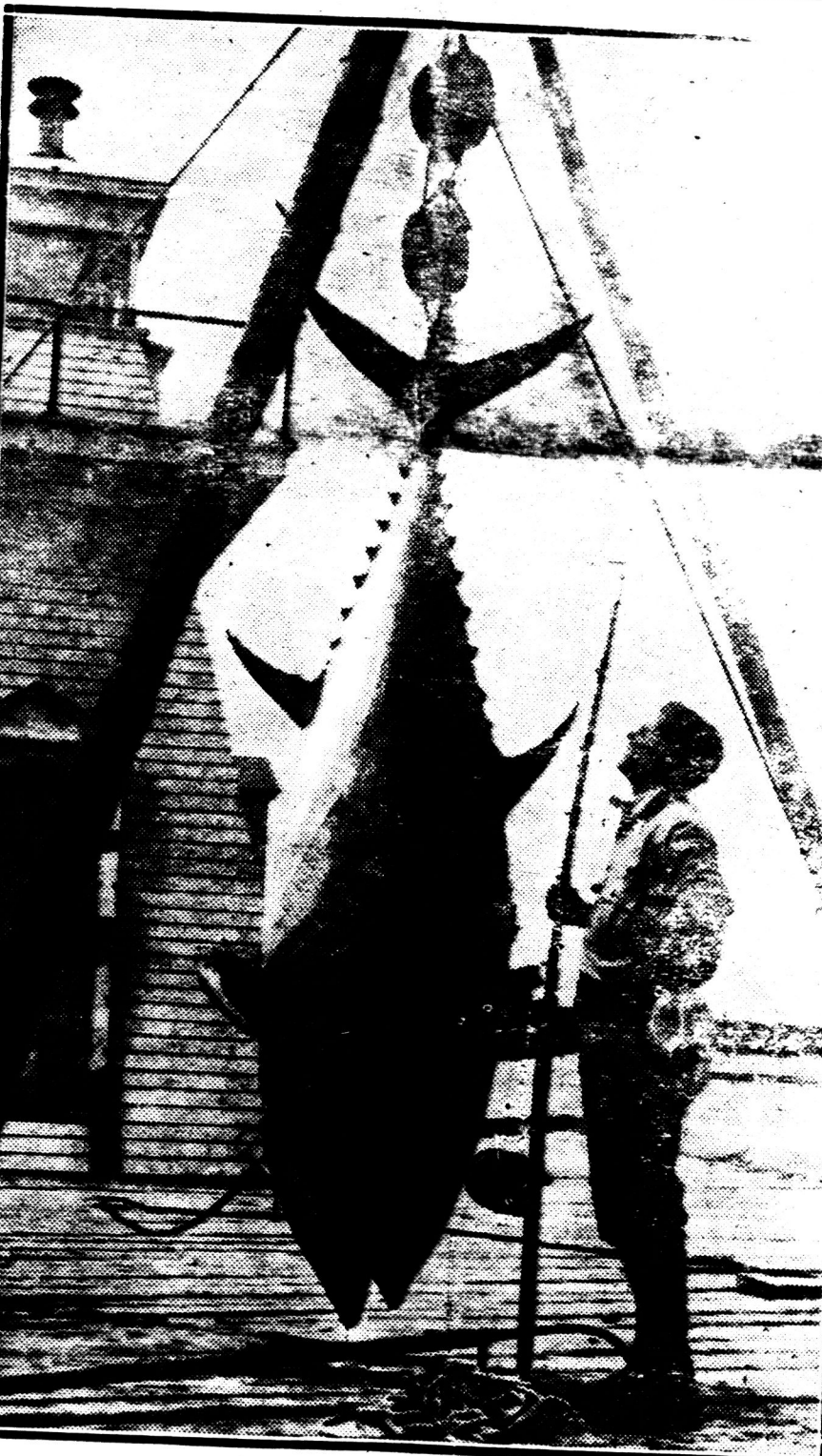
500 FARM BOYS WILL HAVE NO IDLE MOMENTS DURING THE TORONTO TRIP.

If any of the five hundred Ontario farm boys who are to visit the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto this month have any time on their minds on which to be homesick, it will not be the fault of those who have arranged the program for their visit. Starting off with a bang-up dinner at Hart House, the famous social centre of the University of Toronto, on the night of their arrival, the boys will have three days crowded with interest, entertainment and instruction. Hon. John S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture, will be the chairman at the banquet, and the boys will hear addresses by Premier Howard Ferguson and Dr. H. J. Cody, the chairman of the Board of Governors of the University.

On Wednesday, November 21st, the boys will be taken for a tour of the Union stock yards and the packing plants where they will see the whole process of marketing livestock

and the ultimate manufacturing of the animals into meat products. In the afternoon of the same day they will be taken through the huge manufacturing plant of the Massey-Harris Company Limited and will see the different factory processes in the production of farm implements. They will be guests of the Council of Canadian Meat Packers at luncheon at the Massey-Harris Company at supper. In the evening they will attend the Royal Winter Fair. In the evening they will be guests of the T. Eaton Co., Limited, at a banquet.

On Friday, the last day, the boys will be taken through the Ontario Parliament buildings, and will be given a motor trip around the Capital City as guests of the City of Toronto. More time will be spent in inspecting exhibits at the fair, and in the evening, those boys that have survived three days of high living and are not overcome by the pangs of indigestion, will be treated to another banquet by The Robert Simpson Company Limited. They will leave for home the following morning.



Monster Tuna Taken in Canadian Waters

As a writer of stirring tales of the Border and the mid-western states in the early days, Zane Grey has made an enviable record for himself, but now along he comes with another—a fish story—and better still, presents the proof in photograph, so that his yarn does not take on the semblance of a dream or a good bit of story-telling.

Tuna, weighing nearly half a ton, are the reward of ambitious anglers who fish in Nova Scotian waters, particularly in St. Ann's Bay, off Cape Breton. Three mammoth tuna have been taken from this locality, each holding the world's record in turn.

Captain Laurie D. Mitchell's 710 pound tuna held a record for a number of years, till along came J. K. L. Ross of Montreal, well known as an owner of racing horses, director of the Canadian Pacific Railway and as a fisherman. He landed a tuna after a 3 1/2 hours' fight, that measured 9 ft. and 2 in. in length, and 6 ft. in girth, and tipped the scales at 712 lbs. thus winning the honour of record tuna fishing from Captain Mitchell by 2 lbs.

His record seemed secure, when along in August, 1924, came Zane Grey and his brother, R. C. Grey, eager to catch big tuna. They used a Nova Scotian-built schooner, a staunch little craft admirably adapted to their plans and needs. They got

three tuna, weighing respectively 693, 684, and then as a climax, the biggest tuna ever landed, weighing 758 pounds. Had they gone in for anything larger, it would have required a C. P. R. freight car to haul it to the cannery at St. Andrews. The time taken to land the first was 6 hours and 10 minutes, for the second, 38 min., which was caught by R. C. Grey, and 3 hours and 10 min. were spent to conquer the record breaker, with which Zane Grey is said to have wrestled the palm from the C. P. R. director and won the title of champion tuna fisherman.

Other big fish of various species taken in various Canadian waters, include a record pike caught in Big Lac Nemiquing in the Laurentians at Quebec, weighing 58 lbs.; a 38 1/2 lb. muskellunge caught in 1924 in French River, Ontario, by Samuel Williams; and a record speckled trout, weighing 14 1/2 lbs., taken from Nipigon River by Dr. J. W. Cook of Fort Frances, and a great Northern pike, which gave Harold Sweater of New York a 45 minute fight on Nipigon.

Canada's infinitude of rivers and lakes are filled with a vast wealth of fish, many of them of record measure and size. The foregoing are a few of the best.
