## Here and There

Canada spent \$40,000,000 last  
year for pensions and re-establish-  
ment of Veterans of the Great War,  
according to a report recently issued  
from Ottawa by the department in  
charge of this work.

Without a dissenting voice over  
4,000 cattle owners in 200 districts  
have voted to make Prince Edward  
Island a disease-free area under the  
Department of Agriculture arrange-  
ment which calls for a two-thirds  
vote of all cattle owners.

Two thousand young buffalo from  
the Wainwright herd will make a  
700-mile trek northward this summer  
to the buffalo reserve on the  
Slave River where they will be turned  
loose to mingle with the wild  
bison which roam that area.

"In all parts of Canada and the  
United States," according to Robt.  
G. Hodgson, editor of the Fur Trade  
Journal of Canada, "Muskrat farms  
are being established, mostly on a  
large scale and they are rapidly  
turning what was once marshland  
of little value into the most pro-  
ductive part of the farm," Mr. Hodgson  
adds.

The record established recently at  
Acme when 114 horses worked in  
one field at one time sowing the  
crop of Mrs. C. W. King, has been  
broken at Gadsby, Alberta. When  
the neighbors of J. B. Ball who re-  
cently suffered a broken arm, put in  
his 100-acre crop, 30 outfits were  
at work on one day and 175 horses.  
The crop was put in in a single day.

H. E. Morris, whose horse Manna  
made a run away victory in the  
English Derby, will visit Canada in  
the fall en route to China from  
which country he hails. He will  
sail on the Canadian Pacific S.S.  
Minneapolis from Southampton on  
October 8, stay a short time in the  
Dominion, and sail from Vancouver  
for China on the S.S. Empress of  
Australia, October 28.

Rebuilt in nine months after the  
fire that destroyed it last October,  
the Chateau Lake Louise hotel  
opened for the current season on  
Sunday, May 31 as the Trans-Can-  
ada train arrived from its cross-  
continent run. The hotel was re-  
built under exceptionally difficult  
conditions in temperatures as low  
as fifty degrees below zero during  
which a wooden wall heated by  
stoves had to be erected about the  
construction works.

Following the opening visit by  
Their Majesties King George and  
Queen Mary to the Wembley Exhi-  
bition, the Duke and Duchess of  
York also went over the grounds.  
Their Majesties were especially de-  
lighted with Treasure Island, the  
Paradise of children, and travelled  
over the miniature Canadian Pacific  
train that runs around the island,  
passing on route the replica of Banff  
Station and the reproduction of the  
Canadian Pacific Rockies.

Canada will be well represented  
at the New Zealand and South Seas  
International Exhibition to be held  
at Dunedin between November, 1925  
and April, 1926. Both the Dominion  
Government and the Canadian Pa-  
cific Railway have announced their  
intention to send well-appointed ex-  
hibits to the Exposition. It is prob-  
able that the provincial governments  
and many Canadian manufacturers  
will follow suit.

## Here and There

During 1924 the Canadian Co-  
operative Wool Growers' Association  
sold 2,000,000 pounds of wool, mak-  
ing a total of 25,245,000 pounds  
handled since the organization seven  
years ago. Wool was first exported  
in 1922.

Filings on oil land in South Al-  
berta are drawing near the R.P.  
much, owned by the Prince of Wales.  
The ranch is said to be on a British  
outcrop and portions of it may have  
been staked out by oil seekers be-  
fore the spring in the advanced.

Caribon are coming back to New  
Brunswick, says the Chief Game  
Warden of that province. This is  
regarded as a testimony to the pro-  
ductive methods employed by the  
guides who are fully aware that the  
best means of protecting their live-  
hounds is to see that hunting of big  
game is not carried to excess.

"Relations between France and  
England were never more cordial  
than they are to-day," said Hon. W.  
C. Nichol, Lieutenant-Governor of British  
Columbia, interviewed on his return  
to Canada from a visit to France.  
Referring to his own province His  
Excellency said there was every indica-  
tion of British Columbia being  
swamped with tourists this year.

Lawrence McLachlan, of Toronto,  
after serving nearly fifty years on  
the employ of the Canadian Pacific  
Railway has been retired on pension  
at his own request. He was pre-  
sented at leaving with an embossed  
address and gold watch and chain,  
which were handed to him by R. W.  
Scott, superintendent of Toronto Ter-  
minals, on behalf of his friends and  
associates.

The Prince of Wales, just before  
setting out for his tour of South  
Africa and South America, took a  
lightning trip to the Wembley Ex-  
hibition grounds. His Royal High-  
ness was especially delighted with  
the children's section of the Park,  
Treasure Island, the main attraction  
of which is a Canadian Pacific model  
train in which the kiddies will "tour  
the Rockies."

The Canadian Pacific S.S. "Mont-  
real" docked at New York recently  
after her second and final West In-  
dian cruise of the season with a  
veritable zoo on board, collected by  
passengers and to be taken inland  
as souvenirs. It included 500 par-  
rots, and love birds, several monkeys,  
a deer and a Mexican tiger. Some  
of these are destined for various  
cities in Canada.

Saskatchewan can boast of a  
family of six generations. Mrs.  
Odell, of Hanley, 90 years of age,  
has a great-grand-granddaughter  
of six months. Her oldest daughter  
is 76. She has 30 grandchildren,  
45 great-grandchildren, seven great-  
great-grandchildren and the little  
baby first referred to. Mrs. Odell  
still reads and sews without eye-  
glasses.

Immigrants who chanted and sang  
their happiness at arriving in Can-  
ada were welcomed recently at the  
Montreal Windsor Station when a  
batch of fifty canaries in six cages  
were housed there for a time waiting  
conveyance by train. They had al-  
ready travelled over 3,000 miles from  
Liverpool and had a further proof  
post of another 4,500 until they  
reached their destination either at  
Vancouver or in some cases San  
Francisco.

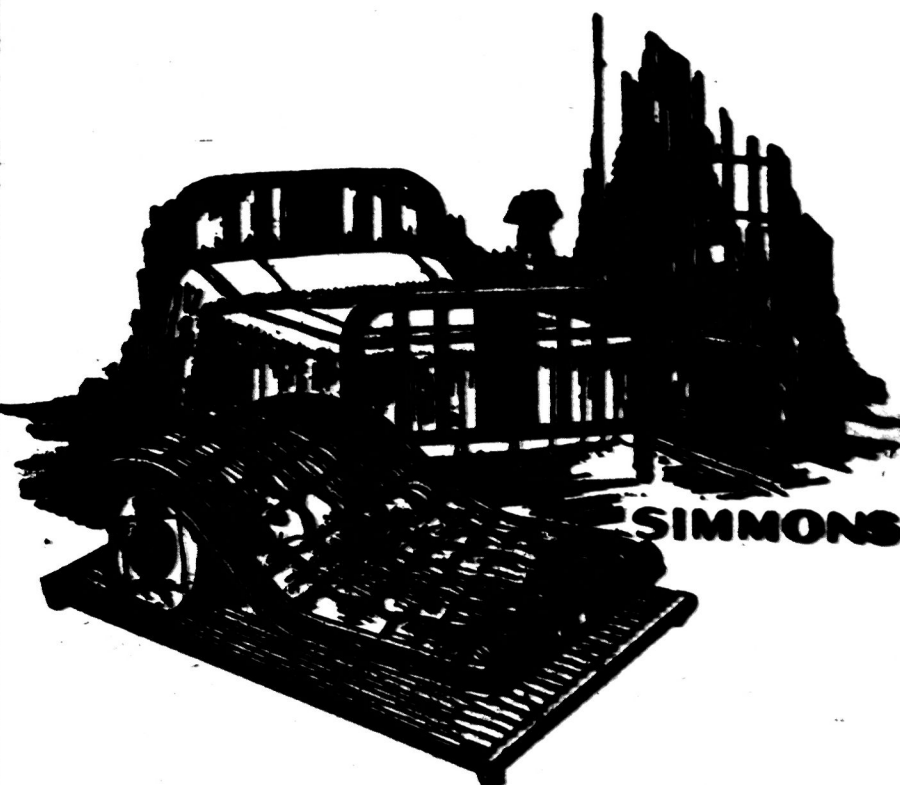
