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## CONFEDERATION PLAQUE PRESENTED

### Interesting Program Given by Pupils of Jarvis School

A very pleasant time was spent at the Jarvis school on Monday, Sept. 24th, it being the occasion of the unveiling of the Confederation plaque donated by the minister of education, the Hon. Howard Ferguson, to every school in the province to commemorate Canada's 60 years of confederation in 1927. The program opened with Miss McKim, principal of the continuation school in the chair. The children sang with zest, "O Canada," Mr. J. L. Mitchener, P.S.L., unveiled the plaque and complimented the pupils on their singing telling them he hoped they would always be able to sing their national anthem "O Canada" and whenever called upon to sing it as if they were not ashamed of it. Every Canadian should be able to sing it. He also gave a little sketch of Confederation and how the country had grown from four provinces to nine. The pupils sang the chorus of "The Maple Leaf," after which Mr. George L. Miller, Reeve of the town, gave a brief sketch of the extent and products of our country from coast to coast outlining briefly the great resources of each province. He emphasized the fact that the children of today lived in the greatest age and were enjoying a great heritage bequeathed by our forefathers, the pioneers of Canada, who laid the foundation to make Canada what it is today. The children sang "Onward Christian Soldiers," and Dr. Kyle gave a brief talk on our Dominion. He hoped the children would never be ashamed of the country in which they live and would always speak well of it no matter what country they lived in. Rev. P. E. Deeth gave an interesting address and asked the children to remember three facts about the day, if all else were forgotten. Firstly, we live in a young country; secondly, we live in a wealthy country, and thirdly, we live in a Christian country. Mr. Lea Marshall and Mr. George Webb represented the Jarvis council. Messrs. James Hazlett, A. Blight and Willam Jaques were present and members of the school board. All were called upon to say a few words. Mr. Mitchener presented every child with a "Just Kids' Safety Club" certificate and Mr. Hazlett pinned on each child the accompanying button. These little afternoons in a child's life help to impress upon them the importance of their own country among the nations of the world and help to instill the principles of patriotism. The program closed with the singing of God Save the King.

## FIRE DESTROYS BARN

During the forenoon of Saturday last, a fire totally destroyed the barns and contents on the D. Burch farm at Renton. Mr. Burch was on his way to the factory and had been on the road but a half hour when neighbors discovered the fire. On reaching the factory Burch learned of his misfortune and on returning home the buildings were completely destroyed. The origin of the fire has not been determined.

## Haldimand Royal Judging Competition

### TO BE HELD AT THE JARVIS FAIR GROUNDS ON MONDAY OCTOBER 15, AT 9 A.M.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture considers that last year's entertainment of 500 farm boys at the Royal Winter Fair was such a marked success that they are again offering this trip to ten young farmers from each county.

#### RULES

1. The competition shall be open to all farmers and farmers' sons, living on the farm between the ages of 16 and 26 years.
2. Members of previous teams who judged at both the Guelph and Royal Winter Fairs are not eligible to compete in this competition except for the purpose of winning the Lalor Cup or the Jaques Trophy.
3. Contestants will be required to judge five classes of Live Stock, one class of Utility Poultry and five classes of Crop Products.
4. No entry fee.
5. Entries close Thursday, October 11th, and should be mailed to the Agricultural Office, Cayuga.

#### PRIZES

Prizes shall be awarded on aggregate scores only. 50% will be allowed for placing and 50% for oral reasons on each class. When computing aggregate scores, Live Stock and Crop Products shall have a ratio of 2 to 1. The possible score, therefore, will be Live Stock, 500; Poultry, 100; Crop Products, 250.

The ten highest in the Competition will receive a free trip to Toronto and return with all expenses paid while in Toronto from Tuesday, Nov. 21th to Saturday, Nov. 24th, inclusive.

The excellent prizes offered are donated by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

#### SPECIAL

The Canadian National Exhibition Shield will be awarded to the high boy in the Novice Class, e.g., a boy who has never taken part in a Live Stock Judging Competition before. This trophy becomes the permanent property of the winner.
