CAIRN UNVEILED AT TURKEY POINT

President H. Frank Cook, of the Norfolk Historical Society, has announced that arrangements have been made for the unveiling of the cairn at Turkey Point on Friday, Oct. 12th.

This cairn was erected some time ago through the efforts of the late Senator McCall and later of his son Harold McCall. It commemorates the original site of the town of Charlotte.

The spot abounds in historical memories. It was here that the British contingent of Redcoats wintered during the campaign of 1812, and evi-

ences to show that the name of the district was one of the earliest settled portions of the province. The Historical Society has been fortunate in securing as the speaker for the day, Dr. James H.
