FINANCIAL NEWS

Going Ahead

The rapid development of industries, including mining, pulp and paper, power, lumbering, iron and steel, etc., in the territories lying between the eastern and western boundaries of Northern Ontario, and notably between Sudbury and the Manitowishkenaw, is changing the entire aspect of the province's timberland. International Nickel and Mond Nickel Companies are growing into huge industrial concerns, while the lead-zinc mining and smelting industry on a large scale is on the way. Add to this the immense plans of the Lake Superior Corporation, now in Canadian hands, now lumbering projects and pulp and paper enterprises recently completed and under way, and the population of the 1,500 miles is growing steadily and is bound to increase. Many thriving communities are being built up. The importance of these developments to agriculture and business in general is great.

C.P.R. Shows Increase in Traffic Receipts

August traffic receipts of the Canadian Pacific Railway showed a substantial increase over those of the corresponding month of last year. According to the weekly statements issued by the company, the traffic receipts amounted to \$19,982,000, as against \$18,794,000 in August of last year, being an increase of \$2,288,000, or 12 per cent.

Income from other sources in August of last year amounted to approximately \$600,000. Assuming that the same amount will be shown this year, the total earnings of the C.P.R. for August will be shown at about \$19,582,000.

Motor Production Promises Records

U.S. automobile companies reporting their production in August increased the indications that the total output of the industry during the month would exceed 350,000 units, surpassing all records, for August production shows now are said to be 50 per cent higher than at this time last year.

Toronto Bank Clearings Show Increase

Bank clearings in the city of Toronto for the week ended September 4th amounted to \$128,425,519, an increase of \$18,733,765 over the corresponding period last year and an increase of \$13,508,676, as compared with the previous week of this year.



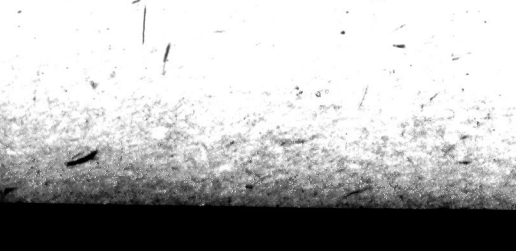

Swedish Culture in Egypt

Engines Ready for Big Airship

London—Five Diesel engines, each of 650 horsepower, will make ready for the new Air Ministry passenger ship nearing completion at the Royal Aircraft Works at Croydon. These engines, being worked by a super-pressure ignition system, superchargers and magnetos are distributed, and two possible causes of fire avoided, while the use of heavy oil instead of petrol will also obviate this danger.

This, in fact, is one of the most notable differences between the R-100 and the R-101, which is being built by the Airship Guarantee Company at Howden. Both ships will be ready for trials in January, which occupy three to six months.

Another interesting feature of the R-101 is that she is designed to withstand the most violent vertical currents which impose severe internal stresses, and which were partly responsible for the disaster to the Shenandoah. Several tons of water ballast are being carried in emergency bags and the lead in the ship can be shifted at any moment.

The R-101 is 724 feet in length, its maximum diameter full is 122 feet and height 140 feet. Its gross lift is 186 tons and speed 70 miles an hour with a fuel capacity for 4000 miles. Passengers will be accommodated on two decks inside the ship, containing lounges, promenade decks and sleeping cabins. A careful study has been made of weather conditions on the route to India, for which the airship is intended, and the first synoptical chart has been prepared for an area comprising the whole of Europe, Siberia, South Africa, Asia Minor and India.
