## INCIDENT PROVES FATAL

A very sad accident occurred on Friday, Sept. 21st, at Mr. Henry Wesley's of Walpole. Mr. Wesley and Mr. Taylor were cutting wood in their yard, when felling a tree a limb broke off another tree, striking Mr. Wesley over the head. Medical assistance was called and after finding out the extent of his injuries, he was rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, where in spite of the best treatment and care the unfortunate man died after two hours.

The funeral of the late Henry Wesley was held from his late residence to the United church cemetery, Jarvis on Monday afternoon, Sept. 24th. The service was conducted at the home by the Rev. P. E. Deeth, when relatives and friends gathered to pay their last respects to an old neighbor. Mr. Wesley was born in Paris, Oswego County, New York state, 76 years ago. His wife predeceased him 12 years ago, and eight children, seven girls and one son, all living, and were present at the funeral: Mrs. V. M.
