JUDGE C. W. COLTER DIES AT AGE OF 83

Retired Elgin Official and Ex-M.P.
Succumbs to Heart Attack

Charles Wesley Colter, senior co-judge of Elgin from 1904 to 1921, when he was retired under the age limit, and former Liberal member of the Canadian House of Commons for Haldimand, died at his summer home at Port Stanley on July 25th, after a few days illness from heart trouble. Judge Colter was born in Cork county, N.B., in 1846, and graduated from the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton at the age of 19, winning scholarships in English and the classics. For several years he taught in high schools in New Brunswick and at Cayuga and Dunnville, in Ontario.

In 1874, he was sent by the dominion government to England in the immigration service. After a year in England and another in Canada in the same service he took up journalism and published the *Monck* reform press. In 1876, he began the study of law, being admitted to the bar in 1879, and taking up practice in Cayuga.

Member for Haldimand

He soon became prominent in Liberal politics and was elected for Haldimand to the House of Commons in 1886 and 1889. In 1892, he was appointed crown attorney for Haldimand county and held that position until he received his appointment as co-judge of Haldimand to succeed the late Judge McMillan.

In 1904, he was transferred to Elgin as senior judge in succession to Judge Hughes. In 1921, having reached the age of 75, he was retired, and in the same year ran as Liberal candidate in East Elgin for the federal house, being defeated by John L. Stansell, the Conservative candidate.

Judge Colter is survived by his wife, who was Annie Eve Follisbee of Canboro, Ontario, and by four sons and three daughters: Ernest, of Buffalo; Richard, barrister, Cayuga; Harry, barrister, Dunnville; Alan, Buffalo; Mrs. Arthur G. McBride, Dunnville; Mrs. R. A. Rumsey, Toronto, and Mrs. R. A. F. Gilbert, who resided with her father in St. Thomas.

An impressive service in Trinity Anglican church marked the last public tribute to his memory. Many friends and relatives attended from all parts of the province and from the United States and numerous telegrams of condolence were received by the family from members of parliament and former members of the house or commons. A private service was held for members of the family on Saturday afternoon at his Port Stanley residence, and the public service took place in St. Thomas during the afternoon. The honorary pallbearers were: Dr. Marlatt, John McCausland, S. H. Pavey, Judge D. C. Poes, Dr. J. H. Coyne and Henry Roe. The active pallbearers were: Major Percy Ermatinger, M. D. McCrimmon, M. P. 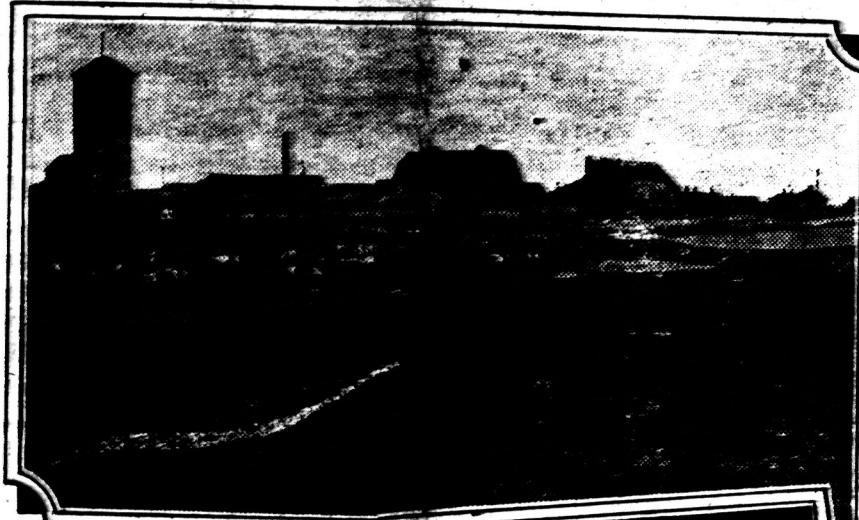
We are pleased to report that Bert Doughty, who underwent an operation in the Mt. Hamilton hospital on Thursday last, is improving nicely.

Strathmore Sylvia, prize pure-bred Holstein from the Canadian Pacific Railway Experimental Farm at Strathmore, Alberta, held the record of all Canada last year for her production of 29,371 pounds of milk and 1287 pounds of butter. She had her day-out at the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede at Calgary recently, when with others from the herd of 600 at the farm she was admired by thousands of visitors. Just to impress on them what she had done, 370 eight-gallon milk cans were arranged around the entire Canadian Pacific Holstein exhibit, these being the number required to hold the milk Sylvia produced. 1287 one-pound butter cistons formed an arch at one end, emphasizing her butter production.
