HEALTH HINTS
By Mrs. C. Erwin

RABIES
There are certain diseases which, although they are comparatively rare and are responsible for but few deaths, attract attention because of the sufferings which they cause and our inability to cure them. For example, we think of rabies with horror, not because it is a common disease or because it causes so many deaths, but for the reason that when it does occur, we find ourselves helpless.

The reason why we refer to this particular disease is not in order to cause a thrill of horror, but to remind our readers that rabies can be prevented. The time between the occurrence of the bite and the development of symptoms—the incubation period—varies a good deal; the average in man is about 40 days. If the disease is to be prevented, it is necessary that the treatment, which by the new Semple method takes 14 days, be completed, and that 15 days be allowed for the full development of the protection which the treatment gradually produces. In order to secure the necessary 29 days before the symptoms develop, it is essential that treatment be started at the earliest possible moment.

Persons who are bitten by animals should immediately consult their physician in regard to treatment. The doctor will cauterize the wound with fuming nitric acid and will advise as to the Pasteur preventative treatment after considering the circumstances.

The animal responsible should not be killed, but should be captured and kept. If it has rabies, it will die in a few days. If after 10 days, the animal shows no symptoms, this is evidence that it is not suffering from rabies. In the meantime, treatment will have been started because, as stated, there is no time to be lost, and it is continued until the physician is certain that it is not required, or, if it is required, until the treatment has been completed.

The Pasteur preventative, or rabies vaccination, is not a cure. It is of no value once the disease has developed; it does prevent when given promptly. Its value depends upon the time factor; given early means success; given late means failure.

The Hand of Death came with startling suddenness on Sunday last, when Genevieve Favo Steinhoff, dearly loved wife of William H. Sharp, principal of Princess Alexandra school, Saskatoon, passed away at the residence of her sister, Mrs. Cameron M. McBride, main street. Mr. and Mrs. Sharp were en route to their home in the West following a year and a-half's sojourn in England where the former spent several months' study at London University. GOUT
Gout is a disorder of middle life in which there is abnormal accumulation of uric acid in the blood. A deposit gradually forms in a joint and surrounding tissues.

CAUSE.—Hereditary, continued use of alcohol, lack of outside exercise,

mental and nervous work or train are contributory causes. Persons who indulge in so-called high living are especially liable to the disease.

SYMPTOMS.—An attack of gout may be sudden, although this is not always the case. Preceding an attack there is generally intestinal derangement with constipation, pain in the joints, numbness of the fingers, headache, drowsiness, and sometimes mental depression, nervousness. Sometimes neuralgia is a first symptom.

THE ATTACK.—Sharp and severe pains in the joints. Most frequently the first joint of the big toe is the first symptom, then it may attack the other joints of the foot, hand, etc. The joints are swollen and hot and the skin becomes red and shiny. As a rule gout sets in in the early morning, oftentimes waking the patient from sleep. After a while the pains pass away, swelling is diminished and the patient may be relieved for a few days when another attack may appear. As this continues the pulse is slightly higher, the temperature of the body is higher than normal causing one to be thirsty. The cause of this is scanty urine of high specific gravity and highly colored.

CHRONIC GOUT is the result of a succession of attacks of acute gout. A typical case of chronic gout—the joints of the toes, fingers, wrists, knees and elbows are attacked. When well advanced these joints will stiffen causing deformity. Chronic gout may continue for years and death finally result from disease of the kidneys or circulatory system or from infection, as pneumonia, peritonitis.

TREATMENT, NURSING.—The treatment of gout is directed towards eliminating the uric acid from the system and reducing its production. Hygienic and dietetic measures are the greatest help or importance. The patient should exercise in the open air, keep regular hours, eat very plain food and moderately; bath frequently using epsom salts in the water or baking soda; dress warmly and avoid chilling; considerable quantities of water should be drunk between meals. During attacks a light diet of gruels, milk, buttermilk, bread toast and cereals. After an attack, as a rule, the food may be starchy, but no sweets, little meat, sometimes it has to be restricted altogether. Liquors are not allowed unless the patient requires stimulation as a stimulant whisky or brandy is less harmful than wines or malt liquor. Avoid eating, drinking or using: tobacco, liquors, cider, coffee, dried fruit; nut, cheese, pickles, lemons, rhubarb, sweets, pastry, pies, spices, rich puddings, mushrooms, asparagus, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, gravies, rich soup, eggs, lobster, salmon, mackerel, eel, pork, goose, duck, turkey, salted, dried, potted or preserved fish or meat, except bacon.
