WENT A GRAND SUCCESS

As predicted, the big community
night held under the direction of the
Save-the-Rink Committee on Wednes-
day evening last proved a "stupen-
dous" success and the committee are
delighted with the results that crown-
ed their efforts. It was the biggest
twenty-five cents' worth of fun and
frolic ever crowded into a one-night
programme, and everybody went
home apparently well satisfied with
the entire offering. From the view-
point of the committee in charge,
everything was carried out strictly
according to schedule and in the final
analysis the rink fund will be benefi-
ted to the extent of approximately
\$400.00.

A little after eight o'clock the con-
cert got under way, the Kenny En-
ertainment Co. of London presenting
a program that was first-class in ev-
ery detail. The various artistes were
exceptionally good and well merited
the demands for encores, which they
cheerfully gave.

The Canadian Harry Lauder, per-
haps better known to Port Dover
audiences as Mr. David Gay, proved
a popular hit and time and again
encores were demanded. The most
popular number in an offering of
some of the finest of Lauder's songs
was "The wiggie of the kilt" and
David Gay certainly knows how to
put it over to perfection.

The new electric amplifier was
very effective, carrying the program
to that portion of the vast crowd
who could not squeeze in just in front
of the stage. The amplifier was set
up during the afternoon and "broad-
cast" a program of popular music so
that all in town would know that
there was going to be "something do-
ing" later in the day. While perhaps
more or less new to small town audi-
ences the electric amplifier is used
wherever big affairs are put on. Pat-
rons of the skating rink next season
may appreciate to the full the varied
program that will be available on
skating nights as the committee are
considering the purchase of the am-
plifier to be used at the rink; and it
would also be available at a nominal
fee for any function where such ap-
paratus can be used to advantage.

A crowd estimated at 2500 attend-
ed, and this would have been increas-
ed considerably but for the threaten-
ing storm, the ticket sale coming to
almost a standstill at 10 p.m. when
the first distant roll of thunder gave
a moment of uneasiness to those in
charge of the frolic. But while there
was a regular deluge at this hour in
Simcoe, it was spared Port Dover
merry-makers at least until 1.00 a.m.
when the weather-man seemed to
make up for lost time. However, no
one could have picked a more ideal
day, and judging from the big crowd
of assistants who gathered in the af-
ternoon to get things ready, it ap-
peared that Port Dover was making
a united effort to "save-the-rink" for
plenty of skilled and unskilled labor
is available, with trucks and ca-
rgalors, all working under the able
guidance of that public-spirited citi-
zen, Harry Moon, who was general
supervisor of the affair.

Prior to the commencement of the
program Rev. D. J. Cornish, deputizing
for Reeve Misner, outlined the
aims and objects of the save-the-rink
committee, and also, on behalf of the
committee, thanked all those who as-
sisted, and all those attending.

Following the concert a street
dance kept things lively until 1 a.m.
when the task of "pulling up stakes"
was tackled, the receipts counted up
and the band of willing workers hied
themselves homeward to snatch a
short sleep before the tasks of the
day had to be undertaken once more.

The Side Shows
The large crowd did not overlook
the several extra attractions that had
been provided for their amusement
and accorded each one a generous
patronage, this netting over \$125.00
for the rink fund. These side shows
included a wheel of fortune, horse
race game, "bingo," throwing the
ball, "the lady with many pockets,"
fortune telling, "men only," and "wo-
men only."

Taking all in all it was a "real
night" — a night that should be long
remembered by those who attended
and joined in the spirit of the even-
ing, and also by those who sponsored
the affair, for it will lead them on
to still greater efforts in an endeavor
to reach their goal—the clearing of
our community rink from debt and
keeping it for all time as a commu-
nity enterprise.

The ladies of the save-the-rink

for having planned and carried thru
such a fine show.

LOCATE AT PORT DOVER

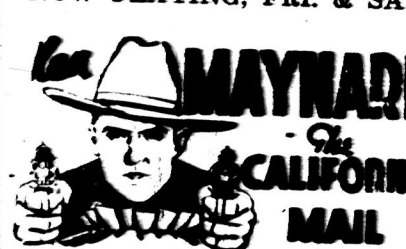
Port Dover is in line for another
new industry. Some two weeks
ago Reeve Misner instructed
Councillor John Walker to get

company him to Waterford to in-
terview Mr. Charles M. Coster,
of the Regal Floral Company,

ing for a suitable building to car-
ry on the manufacture of waxed

a very courteous hearing and
Mr. Coster promised to come to
Port Dover and go more fully in-
to the proposition.

company Mr. Coster was connect-
ed being in charge of the pro-
