Human genius are destined to destruction in the vast death of the solar system and that the whole temple of man's achievement must inevitably be buried beneath the debris of the universe in ruins. All these things, if not quite beyond dispute, are yet so nearly certain that no philosophy which rejects them can hope to stand within the scaffolding of these truths only on the firm foundation of an unyielding despair; can the soul's habitation henceforth be safely built?

What kind is that? A foundation without hope, a foundation that will crumble because it cannot stand the test of time. So those who believe in the Divine Christ believe that God has revealed Himself in His word and His divine spirit by which man can build with divine assurance, the character that will stand the test of time.

"The one thing that is needful in the great world is a right opinion of Jesus Christ. We hear a great deal about peace and perhaps there never was so strong a movement for the adoption of peace and yet nations are building great armies and navies. We look over the world and we find it seething with discontent. The only possible remedy is the gospel Jesus Christ. If the nations of the world would call him Lord and King, we would immediately have the solution to the world's problem.

"Some years ago a group of diplomats met in the Philippines. Representatives from every nation bordering on the Pacific were there. A discussion as to the ways and means of preserving peace was on hand and the American representative said that the ideals of Jesus Christ were not suitable for this day and age.

But the Japanese ambassador: "Do I understand you right that it is your idea that the ideals of Jesus Christ do not fit in this generation?" "That is my opinion," was the reply. "Then there is not one alternative and that is tried?" "If Jesus Christ is not the one personality whose ideals fit in the present national crisis with its suggestions of wholesale graft and sinister political propaganda, what is the remedy? There is no other name, whether it be nation or world, and so we need to turn to Kipling's Reversional:

When drunk with sight of power we loose Wild tongues that have not thee in awe

Such boastings as the Gentiles use Or lesser breeds without the law Judge of the Nations spare us yet Lest we forget, lest we forget.

God, in the great international life of the nation is the need.

"God is the need in every community. We sometimes emphasize the lesser and yet it is not true - at God's great principles hovered among the hearts of people, we would see the disappearance of the things that are a hindrance to the opinion of the Savior of Men. And where these principles are introduced and we must accept His leadership, we find wonderful transformation of life and character. It is only in the lands permitted the spirit of Christ, that we have hospitals, that we have provision for the physical well-being of men, that we have men tackling the problem of the slums. One of the greatest things the London County Council has done in the last few years is to open the old slum district in East London. They bought this district for an enormous price. Between Southampton Row and Fleet Street there is a new highway. Years ago it was a congested slum district. The streets were little better than alleys, they were covered with filth, and the tenements reeked with disease and crime. After the purchase by the London County Council, these old rookeries were torn down, a broad, straight highway was cut through and after it was all done it was called 'The King's Way.' That is what Christ has done for the world. He has put a king's highway for us to march through. He has opened up the way so that one can walk in safety and He has paid a tremendous price for it. Will you choose to slink through the old alleys of disobedience rather than walk joyfully down the King's Way which the Light of the World has opened for mankind? That is the picture of what the gospel of Jesus Christ is doing in the world. Jesus said, 'I am the Way, the Truth, and the Light,' and the one who believes Him, he only can walk in this Way.

Christ is the great need of the home. We hear the criticism of the modern home and we find that one of the greatest secrets of past ages has been the home life. That he was sanctified by the recognition of the love of Jesus and we cannot have a strong, enduring nation if we ignore the home and the only way that we can have a home that will stand the test of time is to build upon the love of Christ our Saviour. It is true that Martha did not appreciate that in the teaching of Jesus and it is because of that fact she did not recognize the finer things that Mary recognized that He was enabled to give to the world this lesson. Wherever Jesus goes He has a purifying influence upon the home. Jesus is the great need of the individual life. The other week General Booth died. He was a great man. I know that the last few nights had been clouded ones. He did not know when to cease his great activities. Time alone will unfold what his life meant to the world; I think of others and I think if we wanted always to give our — if we were anxious to have our lives in harmony with His great life, what kind of world would this become. If in every community there were scores of people who would give the best in them and who would seek to do His will, what an influence for good in the Kingdom of God.

"I want to say that I have tried to present the thought of the supremacy of Christ. If I have failed, it is because of frailty. I have felt above everything else, that the need of mankind and the need of the world is Jesus Christ. There is no other message but the message of the gospel that can bring peace to the human heart. If we are to build upon other foundations they will be swept away. Building in Him we build for Eternity. Mary has given to the world an example of love and loyalty to the Master."
