FIRE AT REFORESTRY STATION

The fire that broke out on Monday July 22, at the government forestry station at St. Williams was, fortunately, not a costly one, due to its speedy discovery and the effective method of fire fighting employed by officials there. The loss, in about three acres damaged by the blaze, will negligible, the forestry station officials reported Tuesday.

Starting from a spark cast by a passing threshing machine, the fire soon gained headway but one of, a double patrol maintained during the dry weather found the incipient holocaust in time, notified headquarters, and within a short time a gang or

m was on hand rapidly quenchin the flames with sand and following Mr. Fred Metesife from Hamilton, up with a system of trenching. This method is very effective in a dry district, where no water supply is ob-

minable. Damage resutled to two and a half acres of scrub three-year-old pine, very small and the loss will therefore be very small. The fire started about two and a half miles from headquarters. Forestry station officials have is-

sued a warning to be particularly careful about the disposal of matches and cigarette butts. As noted, the forestry area is very dry at present and two other fires in the immediate vicinity have been caused already in a very short period as a result of

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
