HEALTH HINTS

DIABETES

Diabetes mellitus is a chronic constitutional disease in which sugar is found in the urine to an excessive degree. There is also a gradual loss of flesh and strength. Diabetes is a very serious condition and while it is only seldom cured, yet many persons affected with the disease in a mild form live to old age. Mild cases of persons over 50 can be controlled so long as suitable diet is maintained. The older the patient the slower the course of the disease. In children it progresses rapidly and almost invariably terminates in death.

SYMPTOMS. Intense thirst as a rule. At times a ravenous appetite, other times scarcely any appetite. Fetid breath of a peculiar odor and indigestion is oftentimes present. The bowels at times may be constipated, other times the opposite. The skin is harsh and dry from absence of perspiration. As the disease advances the patient becomes weak, languid, irritable and oftentimes change mental.

COMPLICATIONS AND SEQUELAE. Boils and carbuncles due to malnutrition are of common occurrence and boils frequently repeated are the first symptoms which lead to an examination. Carbuncles are a later symptom and not an uncommon cause of death.

Diabetic gangrene may occur from a trifling injury, which in health would have healed without difficulty. Tuberculosis and broncho-pneumonia are frequent complications.

DIET. The principal factor in the treatment is the regulation of the diet. As a diabetic has lost to a certain extent the power to assimilate sugar, it is necessary to eliminate starchy food from the diet as far as possible. Diet should be meat, fish, eggs, vegetables, etc., and should not take liver, sugar, sweets or starches or any kind, wheat bread or biscuits, corn bread, oatmeal, barley, rice, rye, etc. Drink tea or coffee without sugar.

TREATMENT.—Of abscesses locally, poultice of poppy head or linseed meal. In cleansing use steamed absorbent cotton, sterilized water slightly hot, iodine, then diluted hydrogen peroxide from 1 teaspoon of peroxide to three teaspoons of sterilized water, then apply poultice again made fresh.

The patient should be in the open air as much as possible; exercise moderately; have good ventilation in their room; bath frequently; avoid worry; live a quiet life. Also the diabetic patient should be warned of the dangers which are liable to attend an operation or injury in order that as far as he is able he may avoid them. A wound or an abrasion may terminate in gangrene, which may start like a blister on the skin of the finger, toe, elbow or knee.

It is better for a diabetic patient to wear woolen next to their skin or a chambray vest, because of the tendency of taking cold and the lungs are liable to become infected with pneumonia. Do not hesitate to visit your physician if you have any doubts of having kidney trouble. Give the physician a chance. If too late he will give you some surprise as to your condition, if he sees fit to do so. This disease is stealthy, it may come on quite unawares of the person having
