Banff Festival Artists



These artists will appear at the Banff Scottish Music Festival to be held at the Banff Springs Hotel, August 30 to September 2, sponsored by the Canadian Pacific Railway. Mary Frances James, soprano, will take a leading role in the ballad opera by Dr. Healey Willan woven around the story of Bonnie Prince Charlie and Flora MacDonald. Stanley Hoban, Winnipeg baritone and Herbert Howson, tenor, will be among the assisting artists. In addition to the Music Festival there will be the Highland Gathering of pipers from most of the Canadian Scottish regiments who compete for the E. W. Beatty Trophy, the winner of which represents the outstanding piper of the year in Canada. Further, there are Highland Games staged such as tossing the caber and all the other sports which feature the great annual meet in Scotland. The Festival is in short a getting together of the Scottish race from all over Canada and is patronized by visitors from all parts of the North American continent.

CHEAPSIDE RESIDENT PASSES

Another old resident of this neighborhood passed away in the person of Mr. Wm. J. Brown. He was born in the year 1853 in Walpole Township. His funeral services, which were largely attended, were conducted at his late residence by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Burns, assisted by the Selkirk choir. A very appropriate solo was rendered by Miss Dorothy Bothwell. "No Night in Heaven." The pallbearers were Cyrus Beck, Wm. Wardell, A. Rocky, William Basundale, Chauncey Evans and Emerson Nie. BOAT IS CRIPPLED — FERRY SERVICE DISCONTINUED

As the Keystone of the Nicholson Erie-Port Dover ferry line was off the end of Long Point about 3 o'clock on Sunday last, a pin on the walking beam sheared off, and connecting rods thrashing about wrecked guides of the piston rod and the piston rod was badly bent.

Signals of distress were answered by fish tugs and a large freighter. Two tugs brought the Keystone back to Port Dover about 10 o'clock that night.

Passengers, including 40 postal employees of Erie, Pa., were sent home by a fleet of motor busses via Jarvis. The Keystone will be towed to Detroit for repairs. We understand that about three weeks will be required to repair the damage and the company has decided to discontinue the ferry service for this season.

FISHERVILLE LUTHERANS TO CELEBRATE SUNDAY

The services will be in charge of former pastors now serving churches in the United States. A large number of visitors are expected to take part in the celebration, since Lutheran congregations in the district are dropping services for the day, and the pastoral conference of the Ontario district of the Missouri synod Lutheran church opens at Fisherville on August 22nd.
