### Here and There

Locomotive Number 5000, one of a fleet of twenty monster oil-ourning engines for use by the Canadian Pacific Railway on passenger and freight service in the mountains of British Columbia, has been released from the Montreal Locomotive Works and was on display in the Windsor Street Station. Montreal, recently. It was viewed by a constant stream of spectators all day, who admired its 98 feet of length, its huge proportions and its generally handsome appearance. This locometive is the greatest in the British Empire.

The crop ranges from 15 to 24 million lbs. yearly and is marketed largely through the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers.

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
