HEALTH HINTS By Mrs. C. Erwin

EXTERNAL APPLICATIONS

Irritants are remedies which are
applied to the skin to produce irri-
tation, thereby bringing the blood to
the surface. They are usually ap-
plied over or near the seat of the
pain. When applied to a part of the
body away from the affected part
they are known as counter-irritant.
Mustard is most frequently used as
mustard plaster or a mustard paste.
This consists of the ingredients: 1
teaspoon of mustard to 1 tablespoon
of lard. Spice plaster: 1 part each
of ground ginger, cloves, cinnamon,
allspice. Mix the powders and put
dry in a bag of flannel, spread the
powder evenly throughout the bag
before applying. Moisten the bag
with hot alcohol or flusk. If you
have neither, then place it in a steam-
er, this will heat as well as dampen
it. To make the spices lie flat, some-
quilt it in block to keep them in
place, but with care they can be kept
in place by putting the bag upon a
plate or tin so it is not disturbed;
then lift it carefully and apply to
patient.

Flaxseed and spice paste is: 1 cup-
ful of flaxseed, 2 tablespoonfuls of
allspice, 2 tablespoonfuls of cinnamon,
2 tablespoonfuls of cloves, 2 table-
spoonfuls of black pepper. Mix all
together dry, put into a muslin bag,
dip in hot vinegar and apply.

HOT DRY APPLICATIONS
Hot flannel cloth, hot plates, hot
bricks, hot salt, hot sand bags, and
hot water bottle of rubber.

HOT HEAT FOMENTATIONS
Moist heat is applied by fomenta-
tions or stupes, which consist of
cloths wrung from hot water. The
water may be medicated.

Turpentine stupes: add 3 teaspoon-
fuls of turpentine to the pint of
boiling water. When the solution is
carefully mixed, put in and stir the
flannel, then wring it tight, place a
dry cloth next the patient, then place
the hot stupe over it and cover to
keep it warm. Watch that you do
not burn the patient. It must be
hot to do any good to the patient.
Or use 3 or 4 parts oil to 1 part
turpentine; put on patient, then ap-
ply hot fomentation to keep it warm.

POULTICES
Stir flaxseed meal into boiling wa-
ter, a little at a time, until the mass
is just thick enough to drop, heat the
mixture as light as possible, then
apply as hot as the patient can bear.
A little Electric oil will help to soft-
en and will also help where there is
great pain.

Antiphlogistine is oftentimes used in
the place of poultices. This is ap-
plied directly to the skin and about
one-quarter of an inch thick. Heat
the tin in hot water before you use
it, then it will spread smoothly upon
the patient.

Yeast poultices are stimulating also
pain-relieving, with charcoal or
baking soda mixed in it.

premises usually in the autumn. I
think that a copy of their sugges-
tions to the Board should be mailed
to the Inspector. As stated in a
former report I think that samples
of drinking water should be tested by
the Medical Health Officer each year.
Sanitation is receiving more atten-
tion from year to year, but the sani-
tary condition of many of the rural
schools is not satisfactory.

Our unit of schools under nurse in-
spection has been in operation for
six years. During the past year four
schools have been added showing in-
creased interest in the work in the
rural communities. Dr. McKenzie
Smith made a medical inspection of
pupils recently admitted to schools.
Defects in teeth, diseased tonsils, ad-
enoids, etc., were called to the atten-
tion of the parents. Some cases of
defective vision have received treat-
ment through parents being informed
of the trouble after the visit of the
doctor and nurse.

EXAMINATIONS

The High School Entrance Exam-
inations were held in June at Atter-
cliffe Station, Caledonia, Canfield,
Cayuga, Dunnville, Hagersville, Jar-
vis and Selkirk centres. Of 320 can-
didates, 269 received certificates, or
84% of those writing. The county
medals given by Women's Institutes
were won by Helen Greer and Fran-
ces Kett.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE, MANUAL TRAINING AND MUSIC

Household Science is now being
taught effectively in a few schools.
Several schools are serving hot lunch
to pupils with commendable results.
I hope that parents in rural schools
will give a word of encouragement
to teachers doing this splendid work.
We appreciate the good work done
by the Women's Institutes in supply-
ing hot lunch material, milk, towel-
ing, etc., for many schools. The
Home and School of Dunnville have
done similar good work in their
school.

Manual training was taught in a
few schools, rural and urban. The
results of the work show the splen-
dific benefits derived from it.

Music is now being taught by a
qualified teacher in Dunnville schools.
The results are very gratifying. Most
of the schools have singing of pa-
triotic songs. Many of the schools
are provided with musical insur-
ments, organ or piano. Music should
be taught in every school room, for
it develops the aesthetic side of life,
and has a good effect on discipline.
Legislative grants are given for the
teaching of Music, Household Science
and Manual Training to encourage
the work in these important subjects.
Education does not consist in the
knowledge of the three R's only, but
in fitting one for life's duties as a
citizen.

The schools of the county continue
to make progress. The number of
average pupils in the various classes
is getting less. Teachers are earnest,
faithful and conscientious, and are
giving real service in their respective
communities.

VISITS

Since recent regulations permit In-
spectors to say more frequent visits
to young teachers if necessary, and
to help with school problems gen-
erally, I have been able to assist in
raising the standard of work. I have
made the required number of visits,
and a number of extra visits. Sev-
eral Board meetings were attended
and I also attend many other meet-
ings of ratepayers for general wel-
fare of our schools.


