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DEATH CALLS RECTOR OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

At St. Joseph's hospital, Hamilton, on Sunday, February 17th, from pneumonia, following an operation, Rev. William A. Kyle, M.D., the beloved Rector of St. Paul's Anglican church, Jarvis, passed into the great beyond.

The late Rev. Mr. Kyle was born at North Winchester, Ont., in 1862, and graduated in Medicine from Queen's University in 1885, practicing for some years in Lanark, Kilmarnock and Ottawa. He finally decided to enter the Ministry and after graduation filled appointments at West Flamboro, Arthur, Byng, Ponthill, Norval and Jarvis.

His life was a life of sincere devotion to the cause he espoused, no service for the cause of humanity and the needs of others was too great, and his constant thought was for the relief of others and which was never confined to his own parishioners, but to the whole community.

He was beloved and respected by all and his welcome handshake and cheerful greeting will be missed by a very wide circle of friends who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. Deceased was a long and valued member of the Masonic and Orange orders, in which institutions he held at different times honored positions.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his wife, who was formerly Rebecca Waddell; one son, Donald Kyle of Detroit; four daughters; Mrs. C. O. Green, W. Flamboro; Mrs. W. S. Jolley, Hamilton; Mrs. L. S. Small, Arthur, and Dorothy at home; besides two sisters Mrs. Geo. Tomlinson of Toronto, and Mrs. J. Sully, Ottawa.

The funeral service was held at St. Paul's church here, Feb. 20, and was in charge of Archdeacon Macintosh of Dundas, assisted by Rev. Dr. Hallam of Hamilton, with interment in Dundas cemetery.

Answering the call of the Board of Trade, Friday night found the old chamber filled to overflowing. The notice sent out a week ago to all those interested in the welfare of the Village were called to attend the meeting for the purpose of organizing a Board of Trade.

The meeting was called to order by Reeve Marshall shortly after 8 o'clock, and he was unanimously elected to fill the chair.

With commendable foresight, the Reeve had made a trip to Port Dover a few days previously and secured two good speakers from the Board of Trade of that town in the persons of C. F. Freeman, Manager of the Royal Bank, and Reeve J. H. Misner; both of whom made excellent addresses in support of such an organization, reminding many of the improvements made to their home town by the result of the activities of the Board of Trade there.

After hearing the speeches of these two gentlemen, an open discussion followed, in which many of the prominent business men of the Village took part, and every speaker appeared strong in support of the undertaking, and on taking a vote of the gathering it was unanimously decided to organize.
