NEW REO SPEED WAGONS — NEW GOLD CROWN ENGINE

One of the most outstanding developments in the commercial transportation field has recently been made available for buyers of 1½ to 3 ton capacity trucks. Until now, speed, ease of handling and flexibility have been largely confined to pleasure cars and light trucks of smaller capacity.
