## The Tuxis Boys Parliament

Now that the Parliament is over it gives me a great deal of pleasure in submitting a report to the Boys of Haldimand County.

The Tuxis Boy's Parliament was held this year from December 28th to December 31st, in the Legislative Buildings at Queen's Park in Toronto. Although we were unable to obtain the Legislative Chambers, we had the use of the three Committee rooms. Last year it was felt that there were too many sessions of Parliament and not enough discussions in smaller groups concerning the bills and motions brought up and, consequently, this year more committee meetings were held and less sessions.

On arriving in Toronto on Wednesday afternoon, the boys gathered at the Central Y.M.C.A. and billets were given to those who needed them, and there was a general meeting of old friends of camps and conferences. At 2 o'clock we all gathered at the Parliament Buildings to sign our oath of allegiance to Christ, centre of the year, turned over his office as Premier and told the Members of the Eighth Tuxis Boy's Parliament to keep the torch burning. He also stated that the bond-selling campaign last year fell short and it was up to us to see that that was not the case this year. We then gathered at Burwash Hall, which is the United Church part of the University of Toronto, for a fellowship supper. After this, the members rose to their feet, one after the other, told who they were, where they came from and what they were noted for. At 8 o'clock we all gathered at the Parliament Buildings to carry on the election for Premier. The evening session was opened by devotional music led by Rev. Kilgour of the Church of Christ. Then the three candidates for premiership, James Gibson, Caldenia; Harry Pullen, St. Thomas; and Harley Moyer, Hamilton, gave their election speeches. There have been a great many brilliant speeches delivered in the years that have passed in the Boy's Parliament, and I feel assured that the speeches these boys delivered have never been excelled. Two of them were in favor of Trail Ranger representation and highly recommended that it be carried out while the third, who was not in favor of it, showed how impracticable it was. We then voted by secret ballot. The one that was to be elected had to have a majority over the other two. On the first ballot James Gibson had the most, Harry Pullen second and Harley Moyer was third. In such cases, the low man is to withdraw. On the second ballot Gibson had a majority over Pullen and was thus acclaimed as Premier of the Eighth Tuxis Boy's Parliament, and Pullen as Leader of the Opposition. Those who voted for Pullen formed the Opposition. The Premier then announced his Cabinet, which consisted of:

Minister of Finance—Harley Moyer, Hamilton

"You want to control the efforts of the youth of the Province. The place to control is right in your own mind. The result is characterized building. It doesn't matter how you do things—within certain limits—if you have control. Don't let people prejudice you in anything. Keep a fair mind; keep an open mind—not closed by prejudice."

The speech from the Throne was delivered by the Lieutenant-Governor and then the House was thrown open for discussion. Your Member for Haldimand spoke for a few moments on "Service." He stated that there were Members present who had had stiff election campaigns and there were also boys present who were there by acclamation. The boys who had come through stiff campaigns had a strong work-behind them. While the others had no backing for boys work in their county. He also stated that we were here to serve the boys back in our constituencies and the only way we could do that was to build up organizations and put new life into the work as a whole. He said that he had read a little poem entitled "The Builder," which said that there was an old man building a bridge across a gushing torrent, and when asked why he was building this bridge, said that he had a son who would some day want to cross that bridge and after his son there would be many generations who would depend upon that bridge for their safety.

The Eighth Ontario Tuxis Boy's Parliament is building that bridge (Continued on Page 4)

## OBITUARIES

MRS. ELIZABETH MACDONALD  
At the home of her son, Dr. A. R. MacDonald, Port Dalhousie, the death occurred early Saturday morning, January 5th, of Mrs. Elizabeth MacDonald, after a brief illness. Deceased was the widow of the late Emerson Bristol MacDonald, who predeceased her on December 2nd, 1916. The late Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald were married in 1882 at Hagersville and lived on a farm west of Hagersville for a few years prior to moving to the farm on the 5th Concession south of the village in 1890.

Deceased leaves to mourn one sister, Mrs. Martha MacDonald, on the farm in Walpole; three sons, John A. and Emerson B., of Niagara Falls, N.Y., and Dr. A. R. of Port Dalhousie, and one daughter, Annie (Mrs. Russell) of Mattawan, New Jersey.

## PARK MONTGOMERY

After a brief illness, Park Montgomery, an aged and highly esteemed citizen, passed to the great beyond on Friday, January 4th.

The late Mr. Montgomery was a son of the late Robert Montgomery and Anzuba Park, and was born just east of Jarvis on what was then known as the old stave road. When very young, with his parents moved to Houton Township, Norfolk County, where he worked with his father and learned the trade of a carpenter. About 1870 the deceased moved to California, where he established a large business as contractor and builder. But owing to ill health was forced to give up active participation in any work of manual labor. Returning to Jarvis about the year 1900, living retired ever since. Mr. Montgomery was not only a contractor and builder of the highest type, but was also a master builder in the lives of men with whom he came in contact.

All that was mortal of the deceased was laid in Knox church cemetery, Jarvis, on Monday last, beside his wife, who was Sarah McLean of Jarvis, and predeceased him about 15 years ago.
