HERE AND THERE

Canary Kermay's Alcatraz, Ontario, a Canadian cow belonging to the herd of Ben H. Thompson of Cotham, Saskatchewan, has been declared world's champion butter-fat producer, according to an award received by the owner from the live stock commission at Ottawa, stating that the cow has won the world championship with an enormous margin to spare. The record of Canary Kermay's Alcatraz for 365 days was 1,080 pounds of butter-fat, or 106 pounds more than any previous record holder. In the 365-day period, the cow produced 26,396 pounds of milk with an average test of 4.64 butter-fat.

There is no doubt in the mind of L. S. James, of New York, as the New York Central Railway, as to whether moose will attack human beings. THE ONTARIO GRAIN POOL

Join the wheat pool and reap all you sow. The Ontario Wheat Pool is not a gold mine, or a mine turning out streams of gold to its members. Rather, it is a compact, well ordered farms company, co-operative with a clear objective and following a well defined path. Its objectives are: 1st, getting as fair an average price as can possibly be secured for farmers' wheat; 2nd, eliminating the opportunity of its members being exploited by middle men; 3rd, providing the handling service at cost. In other words, securing for the members all the money his or her wheat will bring in the market from farmers' granaries to the consumers. The pool member gets all his wheat will bring and reaps all he sows.

There is no winter wheat for export this year, so Ontario mills shall grind the year's crop and the farmers shall get bran and shorts from their own wheat. On the whole the members of the grain trade throughout the 16 counties in which the pool is organized show a reasonable spirit of co-operation. They want the business of pool members because it is profitable to them and many of them admit frankly that the development of the pool has brought bigger returns to growers than they have got under the old system of marketing, so why not join the wheat pool and reap all you sow.

Here and There

Many Indians of the Nipigon district will not touch bear meat because they are mostly members of the Bear Club, says Clark Wapiti. They are averse to killing the bear and one hunting party refused to touch the meat.

A trout weighing eight pounds was a catch reported last summer by William Mitchell in the neighbourhood of Banff, Alberta.

My record for the season is 3-6 fish," he writes, "all caught on rod and line within easy reach of Banff. Recently at Wapiti I caught two six pound rainbows and several cutthroat weighing from two to three and a half pounds."

A record was hung up beside the Christmas stockings of the employees of the Canadian Pacific Express Company on Christmas Day when, from coast to coast, every Christmas package was delivered to its destination, except where there was no one to receive them. According to T. E. McDermott, president of the company, express traffic was unusually heavy this season and was well handled.

Many enquiries for Rewart wheat, one of the early ripening varieties evolved by the Canadian Government Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, are being received by the Dominion Cerealists. The grain will have 10,000 bushels of this new wheat for distribution, and the 350 growers who were allowed to grow Rewart in 1923 will have a surplus of 2,000 bushels making available 12,000 bushels for seed in 1924.

Production of agricultural implements and machinery in Canada amounted to \$42,996,288 in 1927, according to the Bureau of Statistics, as compared with \$38,269,214 for the previous year and \$24,776,216 for 1925. Of the 65 firms reporting, 43 were in Ontario, 12 in Quebec, 4 in Manitoba, 4 in Alberta, one in Saskatchewan and one in Prince Edward Island.

Having successfully completed her trials off Scotland the new Canadian Pacific British Columbia coastal steamship "Princess Norah" will arrive shortly at Victoria, Vancouver Island. The new ship is the seventeenth "Princess" of the company's fleet and is equipped with bow puffers to facilitate navigation in the narrow channels of the west coast.

Canadian seed wheat is in considerable demand in South America according to officials of the agricultural department of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Winnipeg. A ton of seed wheat was recently shipped from Brandon to Peru via wheat ranchers, and it is expected that further orders will come from the South American republic.

Less than a minute was required to launch each boat when the life saving equipment of the Canadian Pacific liner "Duchess of Bedford" received its regular test at New York recently before embarking its Christmas cruise of the West Indies. "The finest and most efficient boat lowering apparatus I have ever seen," was the comment made by John J. Grady, head of the United States steamship inspection service, who was present at the test. The "Duchess of Bedford" is one of four sister ships of the new "Duchess" class all of whom are speedy oil burners and equipped with the same efficient life saving apparatus for use in an emergency.
