## Haldimand County Presbyterian United Church W.M.S.

The third annual meeting of the Haldimand Presbytery of the Wesleyan's Missionary Society of the United Church was held in Grace United Church, Dunnville on Thursday, January 10th, with two sessions.

The morning session opened with Mrs. Anderson of Dunnville, the president of the society, presiding. Hymn 151 was sung and Mrs. Aithen of So. Cayuga, read a portion of Scripture from St. Luke's gospel, 8th chapter, making a few comments. This was followed by prayer.

Despite the inclement weather and the slippery condition of the roads, a large attendance of delegates and friends from different parts of the county were present. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by Mrs. Trousdale and approved. Mrs. C. Payne of Dunnville, very graciously welcomed the visitors in a few well chosen words and Mrs. J. R. Pond of Chesapeake, responded, thanking her on behalf of the visiting delegation for this hearty welcome. Mrs. Newman of Jarvis, gave the treasurer's report and although not quite completed, showed some very encouraging figures, and while the whole sum allotted to the county has not been reached, eight auxiliaries have met their allocation and still all hold the optimistic view of reaching to a greater degree in the coming year.

The corresponding secretary, Mrs. J. N. Allen of Dunnville, gave a very satisfactory summary of all the reports sent to her from the various auxiliaries in the county, making reference to the great success being accomplished by the women. The president, Mrs. Anderson, then gave a very short but touching address, urging us on to greater zeal in the Master's work and reminding all that we should consider all missions as our own.

Mrs. Heaslip of Caledonia, then favored with a solo entitled, "The Sweet Story of Old," assisted at the piano by Mrs. McGregor of Caledonia.

Mrs. Richardson of Caledonia, was appointed convener of the Courtesy Committee.

Mrs. Monsinger of Taplestown, Superintendent of Mission Band work in the Hamilton Conference Branch, then was introduced and gave a splendid outline of Mission Band work, showing plainly the great need of creating an interest in Missionary work in very young children and also in growing boys and girls. She made mention of several distinguished missionaries who had heard the call to mission fields during their early years and stressed the fact that early training makes future efficiency.

Mrs. E. W. Brearley of Hagersville, reported for the Strangers Secretary work, stating that in this work it is not figures alone that count but the cheerful smile and comforting words that mean so much to many who are away from home and friends.

Mrs. McClung of Cayuga, gave a report on the work of the Superintendent of Missionary Monthly and expressed the wish that the number of subscribers might be increased, as only 346 subscriptions were now on the list.

Mrs. Turnbull of East Seneca, in reporting on the literature work made mention that only six reports had come in but hoped for better results as the work became better known.

Mrs. Lint of Dunnville, gave a splendid report of the increasing interest in Mission Band and Baby

Band work and expressed the wish that many more auxiliaries might be organized this coming year.

This closed the morning session and the president announced that lunch was ready in the basement of the church, to which we were all invited. After partaking of this bountiful repast, prepared by the Dunnville ladies, and while still seated at the table greetings were brought from sister societies; Mrs. M. S. Goss, from the Anglican; Mrs. A. Camelford, from the Baptist, and Mrs. H. Walker, from the Presbyterian, all expressing great pleasure at being present. Mrs. Gilpin replied, thus showing the great spirit of unity prevailing in Dunnville.

The afternoon session opened with the Communion, administered by Rev. D. A. Moir, assisted by the visiting brethren. Mrs. Deeth of Jarvis, read the Scripture lesson from 1st Epistle of John and other selections, making a few comments and asking the question: "Do we take time to sit down and examine ourselves, ever remembering that our own character and our own life is our living testimony, and so let your light shine." Prayer was then offered by Mrs. M. Wood of Jarvis, who also reported the increasing interest shown in the work of the Y.W.A. and circles.

Mrs. Burgess reported on Christian Stewardship and stated that systematic giving was generally adopted. She also expressed the wish that a Christian Stewardship and Finance Committee be appointed for the county. This motion was approved and the following ladies were appointed: Mrs. A. H. Smith, South Cayuga; Mrs. N. H. Chesapeake; Mrs. Newman, Jarvis; Mrs. L. B. Gowan, Hagersville; Mrs. Anderson, Dunnville; Mrs. Bur-Caledonia. There was also a

very interesting special effort to reach their allocation quarterly and thus make it much easier to overcome the extra effort at the end of the year. This met with general approval of those present.

Mrs. Almas reported for Supply work. She gave a brief description of the two bales sent out to Saskatchewan from the county and also made reference to the Christmas presents that had been sent to Miss H. and for distribution at the Mission, and mentioned the number of letters and telephone calls in connection with the supply work.

Mrs. Arnott, president of the Hamilton Conference Branch, was then introduced and opened her address by bringing before the delegates the great importance of filling out all reports properly and asked all to refer to the December Missionary Monthly for any information necessary on sending in reports. She urged us all to take stock of ourselves by asking the question: "Have I been as faithful as I might have been? Have I accomplished what I should?"

She brought to our notice that all great men who have accomplished anything of importance, all had a vision that meant hard work and much thinking. She gave as illustration the latest inventions, such as: radios, telephones, automobiles and airplanes. All these things tend to draw all people from East to West closer and closer together as one great family. Jesus himself had a vision of a redeemed world. Are we willing to give of our time and substance that this may be done, are we strong stakes for the holding of the ropes in the Woman's Missionary (Continued on Page 4)
