ANNUAL MEETING OF JARVIS AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Fall Fair to be held on Thursday and Friday, September 26 and 27. To Make Membership 500

The annual meeting of the above named society was held in the office of the Secretary on Saturday last with a fair attendance.

The financial statement presented by the treasurer was very encouraging indeed, showing a balance on hand of \$220.00, with which to start the year 1929.

It was decided to hold the fall fair this year on Thursday and Friday, September 26 and 27, and to make the membership 500. The Secretary agreed to keep the energetic canvassers in smokes during the year, and at time of going to press it is learned that one director has succeeded in capturing the first lot.

The society have again decided to enter the field crop competition with fall wheat and oats. Any person desiring to enter either or both crops, can do so by joining the society and paying an entry fee off one dollar for each crop. One hundred and fifty dollars is being offered in prizes, with seven prizes in each crop, of which more detailed particulars will be given through this paper at a later date.

It was also decided to employ Department judges for all major classes at the fair and that the society affiliate with the Ontario Association of Fairs and Exhibitions, the annual convention of which will be held in Toronto on February 7th and 8th.

Important Market Problems Discussed

SCHOOL TO BE HELD IN CAYUGA FROM JAN. 29 TO FEB. 1, INCLUSIVE

The Marketing School, some weeks ago by the Department of Agriculture, to be held at Cayuga during the four days, January 29 to February 1, inclusive, is being considered important.

The Department has been successful in securing most capable men for the special course, to discuss very important farm problems and list includes such men as, George Peart, Chief of the Markets Division, Seed Branch, Ottawa; Prof. F. Hart, G. A. C., Guelph; Mr. F. Tiern, Secretary, Western Ontario Dairymen's Association; J. P. Gaffin, Secretary and Manager of the Ontario Milk and Cream Producers' Association, and others. These men have had many years' experience and have made a very close study of the question of Markets and Marketing and will be able to give valuable information.

According to the tentative program which has just been issued, Mr. Peart will speak twice on the subject of the Seed Market in Canada. He will be assisted by Mr. F. Hart of the Seed Branch, Toronto, who will deal with the various phases of seed improvement.

Mr. George Peart, Chief of the Markets Division, Department of Agriculture, will speak on the problems relating to the marketing of farm products. Each class will be given a four day course in the morning and afternoon.

The final day will be devoted to the Milk and Cream Industry.

Mr. Mark C. Senn, M.P., and Mr. R. F. Miller, M.L.A., will both appear on the program, to lead in discussion.

The sessions are all open to anyone interested and it is hoped that many will attend and come prepared to enter into the discussion. Complete program and full information can be secured by writing to A. Gordon Skinner, Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, Ont.
