AUTOISTS MEET WITH SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Owing to the icy condition of the highway a very bad accident occurred two miles west of Jarvis, when a Pontiac sedan driven by Harry Cuthbert, plunged over a cement culvert. The car turned a complete somersault striking a tree, which righted the car. The most seriously injured were Mr. Thos. Brennan, of Toronto, who sustained a dislocated and fractured neck. The driver, Mr. Cuthbert, had his hand badly lacerated, requiring 24 stitches to close the wound.

Mrs. Cuthbert, Mrs. Brennan and two children were badly shaken up, having numerous bruises and cuts but of a minor nature. The party were from Toronto and were on their way to visit Mr. W. Brennan, who conducts a chicken farm east of Niagara.

Dr. Leachman, of Jarvis, was called and after treating first aid, rushed the most seriously injured to the hospital in an ambulance. At the time of writing, Mr. Brennan's condition, although serious, shows signs of improving.
