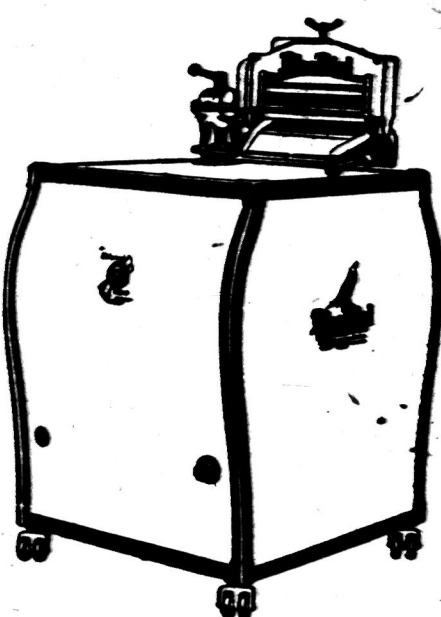

MARKETIN SCHOOL

SCHOOL TO BE HELD IN CAYUGA FROM JAN. 29 TO FEB. 1, INCLUSIVE

The Marketing School, announced some weeks ago by the Department of Agriculture, to be held at Cayuga, during the four days, January 29th to February 1st, inclusive, is assuming considerable importance.

The Department has been fortunate in securing most capable men for the special course, to discuss this very important farm problem and the list includes such men as, Grant S. Peart, Chief of the Markets Division, Seed Branch, Ottawa; Prof. F. C. Hart, O. A. C., Guelph; Mr. Frank Hiern, Secretary, Western Ontario Dairyman's Association; J. P. Griffin, Secretary and Manager of the Ontario Milk and Cream Producers' Association, and others. These men have had many years' experience and have made a very close study of the question of Markets and Marketing and will be able to give valuable information.

According to the tentative program which has just been issued, Mr. Peart will speak twice on the question of the Seed Market in Canada Today. He will be assisted by Mr. Lennox of the Seed Branch, Toronto, who will deal with the various features of seed improvement, inspection, etc. Mr. George Rush, of the Department of Agriculture, will give four addresses on Wednesday, January 30, on the problems relating to the marketing of fruits and vegetables. In each case ample time will be given for discussion and questions and answers.

Thursday, January 31st, has been given over to markets in general and co-operative marketing. Professor Hart will deal with this important phase of the work, in four addresses. The final day will be devoted to the Milk and Cream Industry.

Mr. Mark C. Senn, M.P. and Mr. R. F. Miller, M.L.A., will both appear on the program, to lead in discussion.

HEALTH HINTS

PLEURISY

Pleurisy is an inflammation of the pleura. It is almost always present with pneumonia. When pleurisy begins more than the usual amount of blood is sent to the pleura and there is an outpouring of fluid, more or less profuse into the pleura sac. The quantity of fluid may be so great that the lungs are compressed, the heart pressed forward; the exudation sometimes gives the pleural surfaces together causing permanent adhesions. The characteristic symptom of pleurisy is a sharp, cutting pain on the side affected, sometimes near the nipple and sometimes in the armpit. On account of the pain, the patient takes short rapid breaths. There is a suppressed, hacking, dry cough; some fever and a rapid pulse.

The pleura is a sacous membrane having two layers which form a closed sac; one layer covers the lungs, the other lines the thoracic cavity covering the inner surface of the ribs. The pleural sac contains a small amount of fluid to lubricate its surfaces.

For pain, hot applications in the form of hot turpentine stipes or poultices may be ordered. Give nutritious diet. The diet should be light. If patient has pain, note the patient's description of it and its location in the "remark" column. Cough, put it down as dry or loose; much or little; whether offensive or streaked with blood; easily raised or difficult. Mention causes, vomiting, chills. If perspiration, the portion of the body. If with high temperature, this is an indication of great prostration. Excessive perspiration may be due to weakness or it may accompany a drop in temperature. Any unusual odor in the perspiration, is also to be noted. Delirium, note its nature as quiet, noisy, violent, or the pitching of bedclothes. Character of stool, number.

Diet for pleurisy: Barley gruel, beef juice, beef broth, eggnog (or orange albumin), peptonized milk, milk and lime water, lemonade, fruit juices, junket. Many give pure milk, but from experience, I have found it is not only hard to digest but it causes the phlegm to be sticky and harder to raise. The physician will give, if asked, the diet as the symptoms appear, as sometimes one thing may be contradicted because of some peculiarity of the disease. This is why it is best to note the diet upon the chart.

When convalescent it is better to give no solid or semi-solid food until the temperature has been normal for three to four days. Then give soft-cooked egg, strained vegetable soup, malted milk, custard, rice, soft pudding, apple sauce, calf foot jelly, sage cream toast, etc.
