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MRS. C. J. FLETCHER MEETS WITH FATAL ACCIDENT

The comparative immunity of this district over a long period from fatal accidents was marred on Monday afternoon, July 1st, when Mrs. Elizabeth Fletcher, of Nanticoke, 71 years old, was killed by a car driven by one Thorpe, of Toronto.

According to available evidence the car in which she was a passenger with her husband had stopped on the side of the road, and she had stepped out to ascertain the direction of the Armstrong farm, her intended destination. She stepped directly in the path of the oncoming car.

Coroner Dr. Logie, of Paris, summoned a jury and the body was viewed and an adjournment made. Thorpe was released on \$5,000 bail.

CUT RED CLOVER NOW

With the red clover advanced as it is, now is the time to cut, in order to secure a good seed with the second crop. On precaution must be kept in mind and that is not to cut too low. Cutting too low will injure the plant and must be guarded against.
