**Here and There**

More than 1200 employees will comprise the personnel of the Royal York Hotel when the Empire's greatest hostelry throws open its doors to the public in June. The chef has between 125 and 175 skilled culinary experts under his control and the head-waiver commands a group of over 300 workers. There is a corps of 28 picked telephone operators and there is a printing establishment with three presses and a linotype machine.

With a score of 1402 out of a possible 1500, highest ever made since the contest was inaugurated, Canadian Pacific Railway police, Ontario No. 1 team have been awarded the Dominion Revolver championship for the title. The winning team was made up of Investigator E. O'Brien, Sudbury; Constables H. H. Gyves, Port McNicoll; J. H. E. MacDonald, Toronto; D. Prendergast, Sudbury; and W. E. Tingman, White River, Ont.

Addressing the Quebec branch, Canadian Manufacturers Association annual meeting in Montreal recently, Henri Miland, retiring chairman, said Canada had the second largest per capita installation of water power in the world with its 513,900 h.p. per thousand of the population, being second only to Norway. Today \$900,000,000 or \$100 for every person is invested in hydro-power plants and there will shortly be another \$200,000,000 added by numerous undertakings now in their initial stage.

Fine progress is being made in seeding in the Prairie Provinces, according to reports to the agricultural department of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Winnipeg. Lost time due to backward weather is now made up, it is claimed, the soil being in excellent condition. Pastures are somewhat backward but stock are in good shape.

Under its policy of development and expansion the Canadian Pacific Railway has already this season let contracts for 286 miles of branch line construction in western Canada, according to D. C. Coleman, vice-president of western lines. It is expected that when contracts for the Lanigan-Prince Albert branch are let that construction programme for 1929 will call for slightly more than 400 miles.

Hon. Narcisse Perreault, former Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec, returned from a six months trip to India and the East recently. His Honor was taken ill with bronchial pneumonia when in Benares and for a time his condition was very serious. When he alighted from the Trans-Canada Limited at Montreal from Vancouver he was however looking well and stated that but for his illness had thoroughly enjoyed his holiday. It was his first visit to India and he was much impressed by the scenes witnessed there.

**Island of Orleans—Island of Bacchus**



The ship may be as old as the way-side shrine, and only one tramp where Cartier found the Indians and the vines. The house by the road is more than 250 years old.

"We likewise found quantities of vines such as we had seen nowhere else in the world and which led us to call this the 'Island of Bacchus'." Thus the Saint Malo captain, Cartier, who discovered the Isle of Orleans in 1492 first named it. Four hundred years. Ships of the adventurer, the explorer, the pioneer, the builder of empire and later, great ships of commerce followed those of Cartier, but the Isle of Bacchus has not known them all and has slept before the portal of the new world for many generations. Not that it has been forgotten, but that the bigger ships have gone by. Industry has not destroyed its charm and today it remains, if not the pristine Isle of Cartier, a piece of old France as translated by those who shortly followed him. The illustrations above typify the island. "Progress" has been slow. Its people have learned the secret of content. Their tongue, their modes, their homes are of a century ago. They weave their catalogue; live in hollowness. They are blessed with old people. Yet, a short ferry distance away, and its ocean shipping, keeps pace with the advance of the times. At Ste. Petronille, one of the quaint little villages where wealthy Quebec has its summer homes, an inn has this year been opened, so that it is now possible for the visitor to rest for a while and absorb of leisure the charm and beauty of the forgotten island. But he must be prepared to eat of the good viands of the Habitant and to live a little closer to the homestead. The people of the island will welcome him with good-nature but they have little liking for the modern. They have the secret of content and good-living, on the Island of Bacchus. The name of the new Inn is La Catalogne and it once was a seignorial mansion.
