Communication Committee Report

Home Committee Report

Was adopted as follows:

We met at the Home on June 11th. There are at present 32 inmates, 17 males and 15 females; one death, Mr. Whipple, during the month, County burying the remains. The health of the Home is fair.

During the month the Tri-Mu class of the Baptist church gave the Home an entertainment, also the usual treats.

We recommend that more insurance be added to the contents of the Home.

We recommend that the east and west verandahs be enclosed for rest rooms.

We have checked over the accounts of the Home and Children's Aid Society and recommend them to the Finance Committee for payment.

A bylaw was passed to provide for the liability and general expenditure for the year 1929.

A bylaw was passed fixing the salary of the Gaoler of the County Gaol at \$1,100, the Matron at \$200 and the Turnkey at \$1000 per year, payable monthly.

Globe Indemnity Company, Public Liability Policy is being renewed at a premium of \$218.75 and a policy of \$3000 with Wellington Fire Assurance Co. on contents of House of Refuge at a rate of \$1.15.

4. Re Sensabaugh—That no action be taken.

5. Re gasoline pumps—That this matter be laid over until next meeting.
