BURNS CHALLENGE TROPHY

Monarch Knitting Company Award a Handsome Cup to the Girls' Judging Competition

Mr. A. Gordon Skinner, Agricultural Representative for Haldimand, has just received a handsome trophy from the Monarch Knitting Company of Dunnville, which is being awarded to the team of three girls winning the highest aggregate score in the Girls' Household Science Judging Competition. This competition is being held at Cayuga on Friday, July 19th. The trophy is in the form of a handsome silver cup, standing about 20 in. high, of a new and very unique design and has been called the Burns Challenge Trophy, in honor of Mr. J. A. Burns, president of the company. This cup is for annual competition.

Many other handsome cash prizes are being offered at this competition, as well as four championship prizes, consisting of trips to the Canadian National Exhibition. Full particulars regarding the competition may be secured from the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga.

SPEED THE PLOW

County Council Endorse Organization of Plowmen's Association

At the last meeting of the County Council this body pledged its hearty support in the formation of a Plowmen's Association for this county and requested that the Agricultural Representative call a public meeting for the discussion and formation of such an association. This meeting will be held at the Court House in Cayuga on Friday evening, July 19th, at 8 o'clock, and an invitation is extended to all those interested in such an organization.

It has long been felt that Haldimand County should have a central organization of this kind which would have as its special duty the holding of an annual plowing match. Much can be said in favor of such a move, particularly in view of the fact that plowing is, after all, the basis of good agriculture. In discussing the matter with several prominent plowmen in the county, the general consensus of opinion seems to be that emphasis should not be placed on high-cut plowing but rather on tractor classes as well as those classes using the ordinary fava plow. This would seem to be a move in the right direction as a plowing match and plowmen's association should foster and put emphasis upon good practical work rather than the fancy and more impractical high-cut plowing. Considerable interest has already been aroused in a county match and prize money and cups have been offered, should a match be held.

This is a matter which should receive the full support of every farmer in the county and it is hoped that many will attend this meeting and support a movement that is worthy of their interest and co-operation.

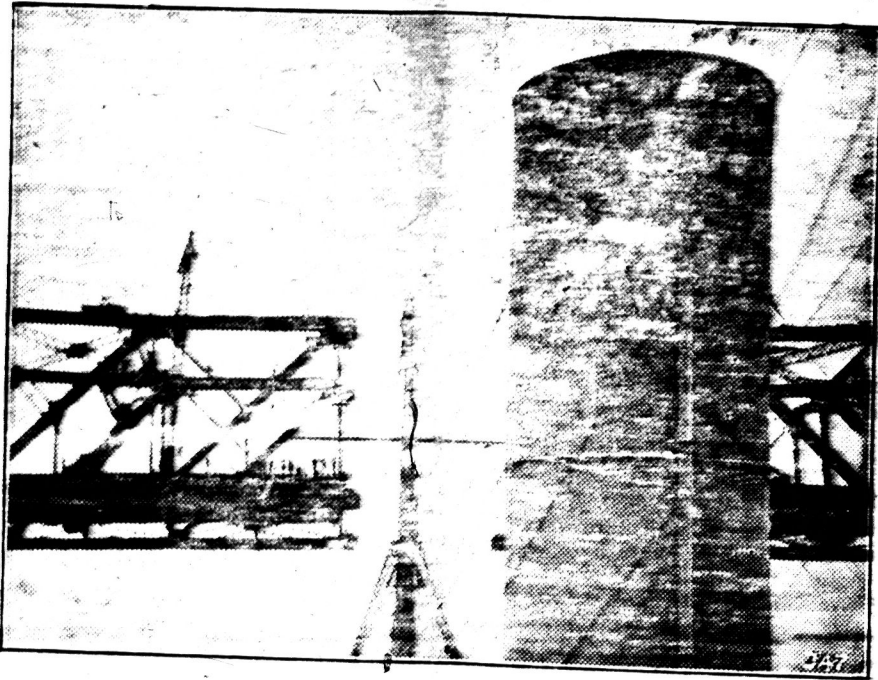

As a matter of fact the bridge is actually 25 feet above the tip of the liner's foremast which itself is 30 feet higher than the funnel. The midjet figures of the steel workers on the bridge give another indication of the great height of the structure.
