### Floods in India **Worst in History**

Thirty Thousand Homeless-Hundreds Believed to Have Perished

London.—The floods in India were the worst in the country's history, according to an exchange telegraph dispatch from Calcultta quoting officials in the affected territories.

The commissioner of Assam Valley estimated that 30,000 persons were driven from their homes in his district alone, while the flood in the Surma Valley inundated a region of 1,900 square miles.

The entire town of Salcher was

under water. No accurate death figures were reported, but it was believed hundreds had perished, and starvation and suffering were widespread. The supply of rice was said to be low; and relief operations were hampered.
