**ACUTE RHEUMATISM**

Acute rheumatism is a constitu-  
 tion-disease accompanied with fever  
 and with swelling and inflammation  
 of the joints and adjacent parts. It  
 is not usually confined to a single  
 joint; but goes from one joint to an-  
 other, the parts previously involved  
 being partially relieved. The muscles  
 near the swollen joints are painful.  
 The joints may be reddened and the  
 synovial fluid is increased and this  
 causes the joints to swell. The cause  
 of this is sometimes considered to be  
 heredity. If you have one attack,  
 you will have another. Failure to  
 eliminate waste matter, exposure to  
 cold, chilling of the body and those  
 that are exposed to wet weather be-  
 lying liable to the disease.

An attack may be preceded by ir-  
 regular pains in the joints, sore  
 throat, a general feeling of illness,  
 or it may commence with stiffness in  
 the joint and high fever, with chills,  
 urine brown, scanty, scalding; pro-  
 fuse sweating; appetite lost. One of  
 the dangers of rheumatism is the  
 tendency of the inflammation of the  
 lining of the heart, and pneumonia  
 and pleurisy are not uncommon com-  
 plications.

Put the patient in a sunny, well  
 ventilated room, but free from drafts.  
 Warmth is necessary, the patient to  
 have blankets instead of cotton sheets  
 and flannel nightgowns. If sweating  
 and the gown is moist, change to a  
 dry one, do not let the body chill.  
 Oil of wintergreen and lanolin applied  
 to the parts, without rubbing, then  
 wrap the affected parts in batten. If  
 the kidneys are affected, which gen-  
 erally are, send for a physician, as  
 it is necessary for the bowels and kid-  
 neys to act freely to throw off the  
 inflammation. The diet should be of  
 milk, hot or cold; buttermilk; gruels;  
 egg; rice; milk toast; white of egg in  
 the milk. Plenty of water to carry  
 off the waste matter by flushing the  
 kidneys. A little carbonated water  
 is good. When the patient is con-  
 valescent the diet is fresh fish, oys-  
 ters, chicken. No meat, unsweetened  
 puddings, no tomatoes. Avoid acid  
 fruits, and not much starchy food.

**MUSCULAR RHEUMATISM**

Muscular rheumatism is a disease  
 of the muscles in which the patient  
 experiences pain and stiffness when  
 attempting to move the affected  
 parts. This may be caused by sitting  
 in a draft when overheated, especial-  
 ly if one is in a run down condition.  
 If the muscles in the back are af-  
 fected, it is called lumbago. It may  
 appear suddenly and be so severe one  
 can hardly rise from a sitting posture  
 or turn over in bed. Gorticollis, known  
 as a stiff neck, occurs oftentimes. The  
 muscles of the neck become so stiff  
 and contracted that the head is drawn  
 to one side so painful that one will  
 turn the whole body instead of ro-  
 tating the head. Pleurodynia (stitch  
 in the side) on the left commonly;  
 coughing and breathing produce such  
 severe pain that respiration is un-  
 consciously restricted. It is distin-  
 guished from pleurisy by the absence  
 of fever and other symptoms. These  
 attacks usually come on without fever.  
 The muscles are tender to the  
 touch; sometimes contracted and rigid.  
 The pain is aggravated by pressure  
 to the parts. A hot foot bath and  
 heat applied to the parts affected;

then when taken off, apply mentho-  
 lum freely. After a bath the af-  
 fected parts should be actively rub-  
 bed. Guard from exposure to drafts.

**NEW CITY APPEARS IN  
 HEART OF NEW YORK**

The Westinghouse Lighting Institute  
 is Opened  
 A city of light has suddenly ap-  
 peared in the heart of New York City.  
 This city, which is officially known as  
 the Westinghouse Lighting Institute,  
 occupies the entire seventh floor of  
 the Grand Central Palace, New York,  
 U.S.A. This permanent institute is  
 for the advancement of the art of  
 modern lighting and is under the aus-  
 pices of the Westinghouse Lamp Co.

In this institute, the public will find  
 a full-sized street 180 feet long, and  
 20 feet wide, and a cross street 85  
 feet in length. Both of these streets  
 have all the characteristics of any  
 city street. There can be found ev-  
 erything to meet the business and so-  
 cial requirements of the average  
 small town—a department store, of-  
 fice, bank and industrial buildings,  
 florist and other shops, combination  
 service and gas-filling station, school,  
 modern home, art gallery, and thea-  
 ter or auditorium large enough to  
 seat about 300 persons. The street's  
 unique lighting system will be used  
 to demonstrate proper highway-light-  
 ing as this particular street can be  
 lighted with 20 different degrees of  
 intensity. Traffic signals will also be  
 demonstrated here. A completely  
 furnished Colonial type home is lo-  
 cated on the cross street.

When you stop to consider that this  
 permanent exhibition occupies 40,000  
 square feet or an entire city block,  
 some idea of the size can be visual-  
 ized. It is to this gigantic permanent  
 experimental laboratory that the sci-  
 entists, engineers, architects, design-  
 ers and all others interested in elec-  
 trical art will come for the solution  
 of their lighting problems, whether it  
 be in their homes, offices or factories  
 to the conserving of the eye-sight of  
 their workers. It will also be a meet-  
 ing place for students of technical  
 schools, colleges, lighting engineers  
 and public utility men, and also for  
 the members of scientific and engin-  
 eering organizations.

According to A. E. Allen, Vice Pres-  
 ident of the Westinghouse Lamp Co.,  
 this Institute is the Westinghouse  
 Lamp Company's contribution to the  
 electrical industry. "When this West-  
 inghouse Lighting Institute was first  
 suggested," said Mr. Allen, "the prob-  
 lem that confronted us was to in-  
 clude every form of illumination in  
 it, and with that thought in mind,
